

public food banks. However, many assistance programs have been disrupted due to lack of funding or donations. The distress of economic conditions has caused many individuals both mental and physical illnesses and conditions that cannot be treated due to lack of funds.

Throughout the centuries there have been economic catastrophes, tragedies, and devastations such as we are facing today in this country and the world. Many will be glad to exit the year 2008 but they are scared, terrified, and frightened as to what the future will bring to our nation and the world in the coming year. Many fear that the situation will worsen and that they will face more devastation of their economic condition.

Regardless, we must all face 2009 and what the future has in store for each of us. This is the time that God must be trusted and we must all have faith and hope that he will guide us through the current situation. God never promised that we would not face such difficult problems, troubles, and even illnesses. appy New Year to each of you. I trust 2009 will be filled with the simpler things of life that help us focus on what's truly important, our family, friends, and most important, our GOD and church family. This past year was filled with tragedy, illness, stress, and financial hardship; and yet God is here willing and more than able to assist us in making wise choices and provide for our needs in unexpected ways if we will humble ourselves and ask.

Hopefully, one of the goals for this new year will be to continue to find ways to improve your health and wellness. Even small changes can add up, so pick and choose the components for your plan of action and set it in motion. Perhaps starting to walk 30 minutes a day is one of them. Start with increments of 15 minutes twice a day. Build up over time to walking at least 30-45 minutes every day. It will strengthen your muscles and your bones, improve your circulation, boost your mood and reduce your stress level.

The "Church Lady?" Hardly! Women and the UMC

From your local representative for the Commission on the Status and Role of Women (COSROW), Suzanne Jacobson. COSROW aims to ensure that the church benefits from the wisdom, life experience, and perspectives of women.

United Methodist Women

The organization we now know as the United Methodist Women (UMW) carry on a legacy of the women's missionary societies of eight denominations. There is a rich history of giving that began in the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1784. These roots carry through the development of Women's Foreign Missionary Societies of the Methodist Protestant Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church South, The United Brethren in Christ, The United Evangelical Church, the Evangelical Church, and The Methodist Church (with parallel development in the Evangelical United Brethren Church). When the Evangelical United Brethren Church and the Methodist Church united to become the United Methodist Church in 1968 this history of women's missionary work formed a strong foundation for today's United Methodist Women.

The UMW was instrumental in supporting women as they worked toward gaining Full Clergy Rights. In 1866, Helenor M. Davison was ordained a deacon by the Indiana Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church. In 1894 Sarah Dickey was voted full clergy rights by the United Brethren. In 1920, the Methodist Episcopal Church officially extended the local preacher's license to women through the *Book of Discipline*. In 1956, Maud Keister Jensen became the first woman granted full clergy rights in the Methodist Church and, in 1968, women were affirmed full clergy rights by the new United Methodist Church.

Women have continued to make strides in the United Methodist Church. In 1980, Marjorie Matthews was the first woman elected bishop and, in 1984, two more women achieved bishop status. One of them, Leontine Kelly, was the first black female bishop of the church. In 2005, the United Methodist Church in Germany elected Rosemarie Wenner as the first woman bishop outside the United States.

On July 23, 2008, history was made once again. Rev. Joaquina Filipe Nhanala was elected the first female United Methodist bishop in Africa.

On a local church level, the UMW is active in many areas, ranging from scholarship programs for the annual School of Mission and supporting missionaries outside the US to fellowship groups, mission oriented groups and education support groups.



International Missions

"The world is my parish." - John Wesley

We are planning an International Missions program for March 7, 2009. We will hold a 'no-host' potluck that evening with participants bringing international dishes to share, representative of individuals' backgrounds, or international foods for which you simply have a great affinity! The focus of the program will be to introduce us to the concept of International outreach projects worldwide, as well as to learn about specific missions with which we have become involved: "After The Wave" is a Thailand based non-profit charity established to help the disadvantaged students at the Bang Sak School receive all necessary support for improving their lives by furthering their education; assisting the congregation of a new Christian Church in Wangshi, China, who are currently building and equipping a new sanctuary; ongoing support of a mission project in Iquique which is in the Northern part of Chile.

We are very fortunate to have joining us as presenters, two people with a depth and breadth of experience in the field of international missions, Stanley Moore and John Cogswell.

Stanley Moore's call to missions began one night in his room, during his senior year of high school when he felt the call to be a missionary, specifically an agricultural missionary. The words of Jeremiah 1:4-10 touched him deeply and oriented him towards a vocation he never dreamed he would enter.

After completing a Masters degree at the University of California and a year of seminary at the Pacific School of Religion, he traveled to Chile to serve at the El Vergel Agricultural Institute near Angol. Returning in 1960, he pursued further studies at U.C. Davis and U.C. Berkeley in preparation for returning to Chile.

After completing those studies, he spent several months, at the request of the Peace Corps, recruiting agriculturists for South East Asia. On his way back to Chile, he was asked by the Methodist Board of Missions to fill in temporarily in the Office of Missionary Personnel in

New York City. During that time he met a missionary from Southern Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe), Beryl Feather, who was to be his wife.

The couple spent the next 12 years at El Vergel, and then was moved south to do rural development among the Mapuche Indians. Following a four-year home assignment, they were sent to northern Chile, where Stan worked towards the creation of an agricultural school in the Andes Mountains for Aymara Indian youth—the subject of his book, "The Impossible Dream".

In 2000 the Moores retired to the Pilgrim Place Retirement Community in Claremont, CA. They have four adult children and ten grandchildren.

John Cogswell is the president of Cogswell Design Corp. and a Machine Designer dealing with printing, binding, converting and packaging industries. He is a member of First United Methodist Church at the Chicago Temple and the Co-chair of their Mission Committee. John and his wife, Janice, have been married 46 years. They have two daughters, four granddaughters and one grandson. They currently live in Arlington Heights, IL (A northwest suburb of Chicago). John's only sister, Ruthmary Anderson, lives in Gold Canyon and is a member of Gold Canyon United Methodist Church.

John and wife, Janice, have led or participated in 80 domestic and international Volunteers-in-mission projects since 1975, including thirty-one trips to Chile; Dominica (eastern Caribbean) 11 times; three times to India and once to Nepal; Bolivia and Peru 3 times and once to Nicaragua; Zaire (Republic of Congo) 6 times, twice each to Namibia, Kenya and Zimbabwe, and once each to Burundi, Liberia, and Mozambique.

We hope you will join us in this excellent opportunity to learn about the experiences Stan Moore and John Cogswell have had, as they inspire us to become more aware of, and involved with, international missions.

More details of the program will follow in the February newsletter, but mark this date, March 7th, in your calendars now so you can be a part of this interesting and inspiring evening!
