International Missions

"The world is my parish." - John Wesley)

As you read last month, the International Missions Committee of GCUMC is up and running. In an effort to help you become aware of the various opportunities for involvement in global missions, we will highlight several projects during the coming months. This month, Ruthmary Anderson gives you a first-hand view of her experience in Chile this past January.

I am still "HIGH" on expounding the satisfaction of my international missions journey! Our "crew" spent three weeks in Iquique which is in the Northern part of Chile. The arrangements for this mission were made by my brother, John who has been going on mission trips all over the world for 35 years, and specifically to Chile for the past 15. The sponsor for this trip was the Methodist Temple in down town Chicago.

Our objective was to build Church Pews for the new Church that the Methodist Church Two had just completed. Yes, I said Church Pews - 14 of them, 108" in length; we processed the wood from start to finish - sawing, trimming, sanding, carving, gluing, sanding again, and finally, varnishing the finished pews. We worked, ate and socialized with the persons for whose Church we were building the pews. We learned about their food, how they lived and what they did for fun. Even the language was not a hindrance—sign language works — most of the time!

One weekend we took a trip over the mountains East of Iquique to a native village, Pachica, which is located in a valley. We stayed overnight at the school called KUSAYAPU, which means "good harvest" in the Aymara language. The school has been closed for several years and will reopen in March 2009. The school is in need of general maintenance and repairs on electrical, plumbing (indoor), etc., and needs assistance. Our committee will review this and determine if this could be a mission trip opportunity for GCUMC!

Helping Myanmar

An alternative avenue for giving to help in Myanmar, which may be a more immediate help than funding from UMCOR is through an individual at the International School Yangon. Jim Taylor is the Myanmar director for International Development Enterprises (IDE) website: www.ideorg.org. He has been working closely with the Director of the International School at Yangon, Dennis Mackinnon. They have a good infrastructure already set up to deliver relief directly to those in need. If you are interested in making a donation to Myanmar and feel assured that it will go directly to those in need, an account has been set up in a Bangkok Bank. 


Third Saturday Coffee House & Open Mic

Music Notes

July begins a very exciting time for organists throughout the world as this month begins the American Guild of Organists International Year of the Organ. The pipe organ has seen a real resurgence of

energy and interest in the last several years, and pipe organ builders worldwide, and especially in our country, can't seem to keep up with the demand for new organs and rebuilding old ones. It seems the organ is more popular now than anytime I can remember! While I was a student at Arizona

State University (I was ASU's first Organ Performance major) in the middle 60's, the AGO took a survey and discovered there were only some 350 organ majors in the International entire country! That has now changed dramatically!

To take an active part in this celebration of the organ, I will play a major work for the Music for Meditation once per month on the organ. Also, we have some very exciting opportunities for you to experience. We are featuring Lew Williams, the headline organist at Organ Stop Pizza in concert at our church on Sunday, Oct. 19 at 3:00

PM. This day, the AGO International Year of the driving a 26' truck pulling their car on a trailer behind, Organ presents organ concerts all over the world, called Organ Spectacular. Then, I will present a 4 -class series in The Life and Music of J. S. Bach in February which will, of course, include the organ of his day. I will also present a single class on The Organ 101 – How They are Built, How They Work using our 3-manual Rodgers 960 organ in the Sanctuary along with some real pipes. This will be followed in early March by an All-Church Luncheon at Organ Stop Pizza with Lew Williams playing Blessings, and demonstrating the largest Wurlitzer Pipe Organ in the world.

All this leads up to the final event at our church, a full concert on March 15, 2009 at 3:00 PM by Dr. Frederick Swann, former Organist of the First

Congregational Church of Los Angeles (the largest church organ in the world), the Crystal Cathedral in Garden Grove, CA, and the Riverside Church, New York City. It is quite a story how we were able to get him, which I will share later. This will be the Must See concert of the year. The largest crowd we have ever had in our Sanctuary was the Organ Dedication Recital by Hector Olivera. I fully expect to have as many if not more for Fred Swann's concert!

Finally, the Central Arizona Chapter of the American Guild of Organists is hosting the Region IX Organ Festival at the Arizona Biltmore Hotel June 22 - 25, 2009 (I am on the Steering Committee). We will have multiple concerts on various organs around the valley. I will



The "Church Lady?" Hardly! Women and the UMC

From your local representative for the Commission on the Status and Role of Women (COSROW), Suzanne Jacobson. COSROW aims to ensure that the church benefits from the wisdom, life experience, and perspectives of women.





Anna Howard Shaw, born in England on February 14, 1847, was called to preach by the age of 14. She was one of the first women granted a license to preach by the Methodist Episcopal Church. In 1878, she was the second woman to graduate from Boston University school of Theology. Still, Shaw was refused ordination by the New England Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. However, in 1880, she was ordained by the New York Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, making her one of the first women ordained in any branch of Methodism.

Anna Shaw earned a medical degree from BU while serving at the Wesleyan Methodist Church in East Dennis, Massachusetts. By the time she was 39, she was not only practicing pastoral and healing ministries, but was also considered a "master orator" for social justice concerns. Shaw lectured

throughout the world on temperance, women's suffrage and peace. She was the first ordained woman to preach in Amsterdam, Berlin, Copenhagen and London, as well as the first woman ever to deliver a sermon in the State Church of Sweden.

During World War I, Anna was the first woman awarded a Distinguished Service Medal for her work as chair of the Women's Committee of the National Council of Defense. Just before her death in 1919, Anna Howard Shaw was an advocate for the League of Nations covenant. In 1888, during a sermon at the International Council of Women, Shaw spoke the following words: "Patiently prone upon the earth, Sphinx-like, sat woman limited by social custom, limited by false theories, limited by narrow bigotry and by still narrower creeds, patiently toiling and waiting, humbly bearing the pain and weariness which seemed to fall her lot. The truth stood before her and she knew it was not the purpose of the Divine that she should crouch beneath the bonds of custom, that she should yield blindly to prejudice and ignorance. She learned she was not created from the side of man but by the side of man. The world had suffered that she had not kept her divinely appointed place. But by all you hold sacred, let me in the name of my master say to the young women here today if you have a bit of truth, hold fast to that which God had given you; let no power, no injustice, no obstacle, no scorn, no opposition, let nothing extinguish the flame. Hold it high and if the world lags behind, hold it still higher. Bid the world come up to your truth, never take your truth down to the world's level."

All was not perfect with the Rev. Dr. Shaw, however. Though she was committed to social issues, she like many others of her time and many of her contemporary activist sisters today, fell into the pernicious cycle of racism and classism. The suffrage movement, controlled by middle class White women, like Anna, appealed to class and race prejudice to strengthen its coalition with White men in power. Anna, like Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton, increasingly argued that White women were more qualified to vote than Black and immigrant working-class men and women. Nevertheless, Shaw, along with many others of her time, paved the way for women in western society and in the Methodist Church to move beyond the boundaries that had previously confined them.
