

FROM THE PASTOR: "ATTENDANCE CHANGES"

In the 2 1/2 year attendance graph on the left, you can see the dramatic changes we have gone through from January 2019 to June 20. 2021. Each shaded area represents a worship service and the graph legend is located at the top. The five lower shaded areas are in-person worship services, and the upper four shaded areas are livestream worship services. The numbers on the far left side give attendance figures in the thousands.


On the left side of the graph you can see the usual fluctuation that

we have experienced for decades. Online worship has always been a lot smaller than in-person worship, and you can also see the big difference between summer and winter worship attendance. In the middle where the graph is almost entirely green you can see what happened when COVID hit. We went to all online worship services. At first we only had two online services, and we added a third in November of 2020. Then on the far right of the graph at the bottom, you can see when the inperson worship services resumed on May 2, 2021.

The aspect that struck me the most was that the seasonal drop is mostly gone during the last year and a half. After the initial spike in the middle it mostly levels out. It will be interesting to see what the future brings in our worship. Currently online worship is running a lot larger than in-person worship. I think we have gained many new people who now worship with us online. I also believe that our in-person worship will begin to increase as more and more people feel safe worshipping in-person.

I look forward to seeing many active people in worship in the fall. We face our future with optimism and faith. I will see you in-person or online on Sunday.

the new federal holiday, Juneteenth, and its importance to all of us:

(officially Juneteenth1 Juneteenth **National** Independence Day and historically known as Jubilee Day, Black Independence Day, and Emancipation Day) is federal holiday in the United States commemorating the emancipation of enslaved African Americans. It is also often observed for celebrating African-American culture. Originating in Galveston, Texas, it has been celebrated annually on June 19 in various parts of the United States since 1866. The day was recognized as a federal holiday on June 17, 2021, when President Joe Biden signed the national scale, and as such, on June 15, 2021 it became Juneteenth National Independence Day Act into a federal holiday with the passage of the Juneteenth Juneteenth's commemoration is anniversary date of the June 19, 1865, announcement often include public readings of the Emancipation of General Order No. 3 by Union Army general Gordon Proclamation, singing traditional songs such as "Swing Granger, proclaiming and enforcing freedom of Low, Sweet Chariot" and "Lift Every Voice and Sing", enslaved people in Texas, which was the last state of and the Confederacy with institutional slavery.

President Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation of 1862 had officially outlawed slavery in Texas and in all of the other states of the original Confederacy. Enforcement of the Proclamation generally relied upon the advance of Union troops. Texas, as the most remote state of the former Confederacy, had seen an expansion of slavery and had a low presence of Union troops as the American Civil War ended; thus, enforcement there had been slow and inconsistent prior to Granger's announcement.

Although the Emancipation Proclamation declared an end to slavery in the Confederate States, for a short while after the fall of the Confederacy, due to certain political considerations slavery remained legal in the two Union border states – Delaware and Kentucky. This seemingly conflicted situation ended both with the ratification of the Thirteenth Amendment to the of an "out of control" life. Constitution which constitutionally abolished chattel slavery nationwide on December 6, 1865, and also with the final actual release of slaves by the Indian Territories that had sided with the Confederacy, namely the Choctaw, in 1866.

MUSIC NOTES





as to the emotive quality of a given piece. Faster tempi or "up-tempo" music tends to feel different from slower tempi or "down-tempo" music. While tempo usually isn't an indication of the emotive quality of a piece of music by itself, sadder music, more serious subjects, and much sacred music are usually in a slower tempo. More secular music, less serious subjects, and happy music often feature faster tempos. This being said, it's not a hard-andfast rule since there are a lot of pieces of music with fast tempi that are sacred, serious, or even sad and some songs with slow tempi that are happy, secular, and/or less serious. There's a lot more that goes into the emotive qualities of a



piece than just tempo.

One of those additional things is harmony. Harmony is the process by which the composition of individual sounds, or superposition of sounds, is analyzed by hearing. Usually, this simultaneously occurring frequencies, pitches (tones, notes), or chords.



Any time two tones are occurring at once, you're getting harmony... though not necessarily good blocks of most music. perception is based on consonance, a concept have room for! whose definition has changed various times throughout the centuries. In a physiological approach, consonance is a continuous variable. Consonant pitch relationships are described as sounding more pleasant, euphonious, beautiful than dissonant relationships which sound unpleasant, discordant, or rough. This being said, to form good harmony.

Some pieces of music have much more complicated harmony than others and it can give them much more emotional weight and textual gravitas. Other pieces are simpler harmonically and thereby are more predictable and easier to sing and follow along with. Gospel and Jazz music often use common chord progressions, but with harmonies that are augmented with additional qualities and pitches such as "tensions" which are chord members that create somewhat dissonant intervals in relation to the bass (the lowest note in the chord).



Different types of harmonies can impart different emotions. Very dissonant harmonies can indicate agitation, anger, or strife whereas very consonant harmonies can indicate peace, contentment, glory, or resolution. There are also major and minor harmonies which some like to describe as harmony! Harmony is a perceptual property of "happy and uplifting" or "sad and serious." WHAT DO YOU KNOW ABOUT AFRICA UNIVERSITY?



Africa University is an accredited United Methodist-related educational institution located in Zimbabwe. The university offers degree programs in a wide variety of areas, including agriculture, natural science, business, social sciences, education, and theology. Missionaries Sandy and Delbert Groves, whom GCUMC supports, both teach at AU, Sandy in the nursing area and Delbert in theology. They also distribute personal transportation carts from Mobility Worldwide, another mission enterprise that GCUMC supports.

During Covid 19 Africa University developed a mask prototype and hand sanitizer liquid with grant funding. These products were in short supply in Zimbabwe. U-Safe hand sanitizer is now a certified product, available in retail outlets around the country. Work continues on an insecticidal canopy that offers protection from malaria-carrying mosquitos and a cough drop made from Zumbani (Lippia javanica), a plant showing potential as an ethnomedicinal treatment for fever and chest-related ailments. Researchers at Africa University are also conducting tuberculosis research funded by USAID public health grants. Zimbabwe ranks fourth in TB incidence per capita in the world at this time. The Zimbabwe government is committed to reduce both the incidence and mortality of this disease in the next four years, and ending TB by 2030.

The leaders who are being nurtured by The United Methodist Church through Africa University share a personal experience of God's grace that inspires them to be agents of change and vessels of grace wherever they find themselves.

... AND ON A PASTORAL NOTE

My birthday comes in July and with it an annual reminder of realities easier forgotten the rest of the year. How easy it is for me to think of life going along as always until something brings me up short – like the need for three heart stents I recently experienced. Such events highlight what the Bible clearly tells us; we are all mortal and

corruptible. That means in plain terms that we age, weaken and ultimately we die. Birthdays serve as reminders of these facts. But there is another set of facts we should keep in mind, too. Facts such as: "I will be your God throughout your lifetime— until your hair is white with age. I made you, and I will care for you. I will carry you along and save you." (Is. 46:4, NLT). Facts such as: For instance, we know that when these bodies of ours are taken down like tents and folded away, they will be replaced by resurrection bodies in heaven—God -made, not handmade—and we'll never have to relocate our "tents" again. Sometimes we can hardly wait to move—and so we cry out in frustration. Compared to what's coming, living conditions around here seem like a stopover in an unfurnished shack, and we're tired of it! WHERE DO I BELONG?



In early June, Pastor Fred gave a message on community — church community and our overall sense of community. He used an analogy to honeybees, explaining

how it takes tens of thousands of bees in community with one another to produce just one 16 ounce jar of honey. Pretty amazing!

Post-Pandemic, many of us may feel cut off from our church community, and all sorts of other communities from which we derived pleasure, peace, identification, love, satisfaction, well-being and belonging. For some, communities of the past may no longer exist, and it can feel a bit unsettling to think about where to go from here. How do we re-establish in new communities? Which ones? And do we even want to? Maybe now is a time to hit the reset button, but we must figure out what that looks like.

I was born and raised in the State of Arkansas, and recently read the mission statement of a small company called Nativ. They produce products for Arkansans to display their pride in being a native. Nativ's mission statement reads – "We are in tune with the truth that every individual carries the place of their roots with them throughout life. Nativ was born on the roads and trails of America and through the realization that, wherever one may roam, the place of your roots is with you always. The place that's home is more than a location but also a spirit that is a part of who you are, how you see the world, and encourages exploration."

Roots are where we started – by one definition they are the basic cause, source, or origin of something. Roots are the places, people and experiences that helped build us. Many of us now find ourselves floundering a little with change. Maybe we stayed in the same place, but general circumstances changed in any number of ways. Or we changed our place and now can't quite figure out how to fit in.

In that same June sermon, Pastor Fred reminded us that just like the bees, very seldom is there anything that we can accomplish or sustain alone. He reminded

us that:

- Relationships don't just happen, and they aren't
 always easy. Solid relationships occur when we open
 ourselves to others, discuss hard topics,
 respectfully disagree, are vulnerable and navigate a
 path for the good of the whole.
- When the storms of life crumple the physical structures we have built, our relationships with other people endure.
- "Holding hands with another makes the world easier to manage," but we have to step out to have such relationships, or "community."
- Jesus was the ultimate at putting Himself out there to be in community; He was vulnerable yet held others and Himself accountable.

As I've thought it through, our ultimate roots are in Jesus Christ; what fits the definition of the basic cause, source, or origin of something better than our Heavenly Father, our Creator? Aaaaahhh... but the ultimate question – how do we get back to our roots, get the strength and courage to move forward with change, with putting ourselves out there to form community? We must give ourselves the grace to take a break. God gives us permission to "power down." Find a place of peace, return to your roots. Even if only in mind and spirit, ponder and pray on where to go from here, decide how far you are willing to reach out to create new community with others, hit the reset button.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN



Recently, a good friend discussed UMW with me. She stated that she thought of UMW as "older women sitting around chatting". Another

friend stated that she couldn't identify with the ministries of UMW. A few others admitted that they didn't understand the purpose of the UMW in the Methodist Church. In the November issue of the UMW response magazine, women gave three primary reasons for not joining UMW: there is too much "business" in the business meeting, most of the women are in the 70-plus age group rather than their own, and the meeting place and time aren't convenient. Another reason, I believe, is that many women in our church do not truly understand what United Methodist Women is

all about.



The United Methodist Women (UMW) was formed in 1869 by two wives of missionaries to India. It was initially called the Methodist Woman's **Foreign** Missionary Society, so you can see that from very start our purpose was in mission. In the next few years it merged with Woman's Missionary

The GCUMC Permanent Endowment scholarship Society, and in the 1940's merged with the Ladies Aid In 2012, the United Methodist Church donation from an anonymous church member, with the General Conference voted to make United Methodist stipulation that the principal remain in an investment Women's national policymaking body autonomous. United Methodist Women is now the largest denominational faith organization for women with approximately 800,000 members whose mission is fostering spiritual growth, developing leaders and advocating for justice. What types of things do we do today?

- 1. UMW equips women and girls around the world to be leaders in communities, agencies, governments, and churches. This is done through Mission u classes, educational reading materials, local leadership trainings, 1:1 mentorship, and local speaker presentations.
- 2. UMW provides educational experiences that lead to personal change in order to transform the world. We learn more about the world, ourselves and our faith through Faith Talks (monthly online presentations), our Reading Program, mission u, local presentations, Ubuntu experiences, and the response magazine.
- 3. UMW does advocacy work on economic inequality, maternal and child health, human trafficking, global migration, domestic violence, climate change, gender justice, racial justice, health care, and food justice.
- 4. Spiritual growth has been a long-held part of the work of UMW and is an expression of our personal and communal commitments to see Christ in the world. We have the following: many books on spiritual growth in our Reading Program, prayer in every meeting, a yearly District Spiritual Growth Retreat, and Bible Study Circle (the Esther Circle).
- 5. The nearly 90 National Mission Institutions in the United States, supported by the UMW, are empowering women, caring for children, educating youth, housing the neglected, advocating for social justice issues, creating economic opportunities, and changing neighborhoods. We have hosted speakers from two National Mission Institutions: Wesley Community Center in Arizona and McCurdy Ministries Community Center in New Mexico.
- 6. The Office of Deaconess and Home Missioner is administered by UMW. Deaconesses, who are laywomen, and home missioners, who are laymen, are called by God to a full-time vocation in service with those who are marginalized and in need in the world today.
- 7. UMW's international work focuses on impacting poverty through enhancing the capacities of local women leaders and supporting economic development programs. We provide women with the tools required to succeed in finding local solutions and making positive, measurable change in their communities.

It would be impossible to list everything which United Methodist Women do in our world today; and none of it would be possible without the work of all the local members who give of their time and talents in service to others.

The UMW is an organization for ALL women, not just a certain age group. There are young women, teenagers, and grade schoolers who are active in our organization. All that is needed to join is a willing heart and a pledge to serve others. Membership is attained through a pledge; pledges can be monetary, in service, or in prayer. We hope you will consider joining us! We need you and the world needs you!
