FROM THE PASTOR: "FACING FEAR"

In the second week of June, our church received a call asking if we would be willing to host an informational meeting about the Woodbury fire which is burning in the Superstition Mountains. We readily agreed to provide support and the Sanctuary for the meeting. We learned representatives from the U.S. Forest Service, Superstition Fire Dept. and Queen Valley Fire Dept. would lead the event. We had no idea how many would show up but we were told that the community was nervous about the fire.

As people arrived it became apparent that there weren't enough seats on the main floor so we opened the east balcony. Even though it is summer, about 700-800 people showed up. The attendance obviously showed just how nervous the community was.

To calm the community the firefighters explained the situation and how they were ready to deal with it. They showed maps and websites where fire boundaries could be viewed. They described their resources and their intentions. I know that after the meeting, many people were relieved. One week later the U.S. Forest Service held a second meeting as the fire had grown.

I know that we face many fears. Currently our community is dealing with the fear of fire. We also fear other life situations. We may fear the onset of dementia, worried that a slight memory lapse might be an indicator of future dementia. We may fear the diagnosis of a doctor. We may worry that our job is in jeopardy. Some of us may be nervous about our precarious financial situation. The older we get the more we may fear death. There is a lot that we might fear.

Yet 2 Corinthians 4:8-9 tells us that, "We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed." Psalm 23 is also a reminder of where we get our strength. It is our faith that reminds us what is important. It is our faith that gives us the strength to face the greatest difficulties.

We band together in churches to support each other in times of fear. We pray for peace, comfort and help. We lean on God when we say with the psalmist, "Though I walk in the valley of darkness, I fear no evil for you are with me." May we care for each other in the difficult times of life. I will see you on Sunday.







CRITICISM: HOW TO RECEIVE IT



their donkey to market. As they were walking along a countryman passed them and said, "You fools, what is a donkey for but to ride upon?" So the man put the boy on the donkey, and

they went on their way.

said, "See that lazy youngster, he lets his father walk into my office. We had a history of conflict and he was while he rides."

So the man ordered his boy to get off, and got on himself. But they hadn't gone far when they passed two women, one of whom said to the other, "Shame on that lazy lout to let his poor little son trudge along."

Well, the man didn't know what to do, but at last he took his boy up before him on the donkey. By this time they had come to the town, and the passersby began to jeer and point at them. The man stopped and asked always do this! In previous encounters, I had been what they were scoffing at.

The men said, "Aren't you ashamed of yourself for overloading that poor donkey of yours -- you and your hulking son?"

The man and boy got off and tried to think what to do. They thought and they thought, until at last they cut down a pole, tied the donkey's feet to it, and raised the pole and the donkey to their shoulders. They went along amid the laughter of all who met them until they came to a bridge, when the donkey, getting one of his feet loose, kicked out and caused the boy to drop his end of the pole. In the struggle the donkey fell over the bridge, and his forefeet being tied together, he was drowned.

I think this fable reminds us that no one escapes criticism. Even if we attempt to do nothing, to avoid being criticized, we will be charged with being lazy. Someone said that only people in their graves don't receive criticism, but I have certainly heard plenty of dead people criticized too! So accept it: You will be criticized alive or dead. The question is how you will respond.

However, James 1:19 advises us to "be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to get angry" (NIV). This verse A man and his son were going with is particularly suitable for helping us deal with criticism.

Let's take James' words in reverse order. First, be slow to become angry. Of course, our emotions born of our fight or flight inclinations are triggered by criticism. But take a time out. Perhaps some deep breaths or counting to ten will give us enough space to reset ourselves. At other times, we may need to delay even But soon they passed a group of men, one of whom longer. I remember a time that a fellow coworker came ready for another showdown. He said, "Well, I think you're doing a mediocre job" which was even more cutting because I had been promoted to replace him; I was now doing the job from which he had been asked to resign. Remembering all of the prior comments he had made I was ready to respond forcibly. But I paused and said, "I feel myself getting angry. So, I think it best that we set an appointment when I am in a better emotional place and we talk then." Believe me I did not much less controlled. But I learned that this approach defused his readiness for war and helped delay what was clearly an escalating conflict. Lesson: give yourself time to quiet your anger. Stop. Breathe. Postpone.

> In tandem with this first response to criticism, James also teaches us to be slow to speak. In general, we would all probably benefit from saying less, especially when we are confronted and criticized. While defensive or demeaning words typically jump to our lips when dealing with what to our ears sounds like disapproval, swallowing them is usually wise. Words are like feathers shaken from a pillow, they are impossible to retrieve. I have often regretted speaking, but more rarely regretted staying quiet when dealing with a critic.


This does not mean that we should never speak. We may find it helpful to repeat what we heard the critic say. In this way, they hear what they said, which may prove educational. Moreover, this tactic often reduces tension because the critic is probably ready for us to defend ourselves. But, there are also times when it is appropriate to respond assertively. If someone is regularly assaulting us in an unkind manner, we may Our natural response to criticism is to become find it wise to say something such as, "Do you defensive or angry, especially if the criticism is caustic. recognize the difference between constructive and destructive criticism?" In this way, we open another line of conversation and talk about the talk we have shared. (By the way, it is often more productive to ask questions than make assertions particularly in a tense encounter.)

I have also found that agreeing with my critic can make a difference. Once I had a big, burly fellow who was a prison guard walk into my office without an appointment and sit down. He said, "I have come here today to tell you I don't like you at all." What a way to start a conversation! Immediately, rather than defend myself, I believe the Lord helped me to respond with these words, "If you knew me better you would probably like me even less." He was stunned! We then had a conversation that cleared the air. From that day, his opinion of me changed considerably. Even if we don't agree with the substance of a criticism, we can respond graciously to the critic with God's enablement.

James also advises us to listen. In fact, he starts his instruction with this piece of advice. Even people whose criticism is sharp may offer a word of truth. Certainly, a friend who cares for us may give us feedback that although unpleasant to hear provides keen insight. No wonder the Wise Man of Proverbs notes, "Wounds from a friend can be trusted, but an enemy multiplies kisses" (Prov. 27:6 NIV). Perhaps we are sometimes stung by constructive criticism because we readily recognize the truth in what we hear.

Recently, my wife kindly said she was troubled by something she heard me say in a meeting that sounded self-congratulatory. At first, I wanted to offer a justification for my words, but her assessment was spot on and I knew it when she said it. We all need people in our lives who see our blind spots and to do for us what my wife did for me.

As we live together in our church family, criticism is inevitable. How we receive criticism will charge or change our church's atmosphere. In next month's newsletter I intend to share how to offer criticism, since there are indeed times when criticism is warranted. Until then, be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to anger. And if you fail, remember that God forgives our failures. But, don't give up; keep asking for the grace to improve.

definition that goes something like this - move at a regular pace by lifting and setting down each foot in turn, never having both feet off the ground at once.

titled The Road Home. It's the final book in a trilogy, portions of which I believe are supposed to be based on a true story, but for the most part its fiction. Fiction or truth, the story is captivating. A man, who had not been a particularly good man got the chance to do it over. He was supposed to have been on a plane that crashed, but he wasn't. He had gotten off at the last minute prior to the crash but he was listed in the manifest, so everyone in his life thought him dead. Needless to say it caused reflection on his part, and the realization he had a second chance. He wasn't happy. He started to walk, walking the entire Route 66 from Chicago to Santa Monica. Talk about time for reflection...about who he was, who he should be, what he had and hadn't done, what he could do from here forward. He walked his way to a new person. He shed an old skin and put on a new.

Have you ever needed to do that? I think many of us probably have, at varying points in our lives, been where we wished we could change, start over, etc. Although the story I'm talking about is dramatic, and likely none of us will ever get the chance to "start over" to that extreme, the metaphorical value of the story is pretty high. The term "walk" is used often in the Bible in a sense meaning to follow a certain course of life, to conduct oneself in a certain way or to continue in a mode of conduct or behavior. It is used in the Bible in ways to help the reader understand how to walk the life of a Christian.

I've had, and have, things I'd like to change. In the story referenced above, a pastor said "Repentance isn't about paying for our sins; that's what Christ did. It's about rethinking our actions. It's literally changing your mind...The Hebrew word for penance is 'shub', which literally means to turn around... repentance is a change of heart...a spiritual u-turn...not punishment or penance."

What does your walk in life look like? Very likely nothing like the character in the book. But our walks look more like this going to work another day, nursing a family member through an illness, giving birth to a child, moving across the country, If you look it up today you will find a marrying, struggling, laughing, crying, making life changing decisions.

Even if we don't get the chance to start over and come back as a new person after walking 2,000 + miles, we typically have I just finished reading a book by author Richard Paul Evans tomorrow, our second chance. Sometimes our walk is easier than others. Sometimes the seasons of our walk may last longer than another. Sometimes the pace of our walk is faster than others. Sometimes we keep up well, sometimes we don't.

> There is a hiker's prayer that hikers joke about using when they are really tired. It goes something like this, "Lord, you pick 'em up and I'll put 'em down!"

> How is your particular walk in life going right now? Whether there's something you'd like to change, or you have some challenges coming up, the walk is your very own. But it's not so different from others. If it's going great, if you've shed an old skin and been successful, if you feel like you're in a strong place... then look around you and consider holding the hand of someone else along their particular walk, whether it's for a day, a month or a year.

> But if you're having a difficult time lifting up each foot and setting it back down, the hiker's prayer doesn't seem to be working, or you're anxious about where your walk in life is taking you at the moment, then please remember that five pastors are on call to make visits to members and friends of Gold Canyon UMC. FOOD BANK



awarded a grant by the Arizona Association of Food Banks to purchase a refrigerated trailer. Considered a necessity, this trailer will be used to transport fresh fruits, vegetables and

meats from grocery stores to our Food Bank.

We contracted with a trailer company to build a trailer to our specifications. This two-wheeled trailer, dimensions of 5' by 10', will be easily attached to a pickup or van with a trailer hitch. Lettering will identify our trailer as property hygiene kits for Days for Girls. We help provide a hot of our church and Food Bank.

A generator is attached to the front of the trailer that powers the refrigeration system. This enables us to pick up fresh groceries throughout the summer months and keep the product cold while transporting to the Food Bank.

Statistics thru May 2019 are as follow:

- Individuals served 5,945
- Food bags given out 5,723
- Number of families served 1,487.

As you can see, our Food Bank is a blessing to many in need of food. We appreciate all of our volunteers along

with the monetary and food donations. Our Food Bank continues to be a wonderful mission!


