FROM THE PASTOR:

"Questions from John Wesley"

As I write this newsletter article, Beth and I are traveling in England retracing the steps of John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist Church. So far we have seen the church and home where John and Charles Wesley grew up. We visited Oxford University where John Wesley started the first Methodism movement and, we read from his sermons and heard lectures about his life.

The term Methodist was used as a criticism of his Holy Club and spiritual life. He was methodical in his process to help others mature in their faith. When the Holy Club of Oxford met they had 22 questions they could use in their private devotions.

- 1. Am I consciously or unconsciously creating the impression that I am a better man than I really am? In other words, am I a hypocrite?
- 2. Am I honest in all my acts or words, or do I exaggerate?
- 3. Do I confidentially pass on to another what was told to me in confidence?
- 4. Can I be trusted?
- 5. Am I a slave to dress, friends, work or habits?
- 6. Am I self-conscious, self-pitying, or self-justifying?
- 7. Did the Bible live in me today?
- 8. Do I give it time to speak to me every day?
- 9. When did I last speak to somebody else with the object of trying to win that person for Christ?
- 10. Am I enjoying prayer?
- 11. Am I making contacts with other people and using them for the Master's glory?

- 12. Do I pray about the money I spend?
- 13. Do I get to bed on time and get up on time?
- 14. Do I disobey God in anything?
- 15. Do I insist upon doing something about which my conscience is uneasy?
- 16. Am I defeated in any part of my life? Am I jealous, impure, critical, irritable, touchy or distrustful?
- 17. How do I spend my spare time?
- 18. Am I proud?
- 19. Do I thank God that I am not as other people, especially as the Pharisees who despised the publican?
- 20. Is there anybody whom I fear, dislike, disown, criticize, hold a resentment toward or disregard? If so, what am I doing about it?
- 21. Do I grumble or complain constantly?
- 22. Is Christ real to me?

There is value in these questions. John Wesley was deeply concerned that we not be part Christian but fully Christian. He wanted us to reflect daily on our spiritual walk that we might become more Christ like.

When you read this article, Beth and I will have returned from our trip. Our hope is to use the story of John Wesley's life and ministry to help us understand more fully our heritage as Methodists and how some of his teachings might help us grow spiritually. I will see you Sunday

A Personal Note From Bob...

Many people asked me recently about June's name appearing on our prayer list under Hospice. You were concerned whether her Alzheimer's condition has worsened. I'm sorry for any anxiety I caused. No, June is not noticeably worse or requiring the end of life care typically associated with Hospice. In May I moved her from Arbor Rose Senior Care to Legacy Senior Living Community that is nearer my house and seems to offer a better level of care. On June 13 she fell from her wheel chair and fractured her hip, requiring the insertion of three screws. She has recovered very well. However, Legacy, recognizing the need for closer watch over her and a higher level of care, informed me that if June were going to remain a resident there she had to go on Hospice. I reluctantly agreed since I have no better option for caring for her.

June's Alzheimer's is progressing slowly, but steadily. That is the nature of the disease. There is no cure and nothing yet medically that will slow its progression. As I lead the fight along with June's determined spirit, the image that works for me is as if I were in Alaska where the great glaciers move slowly toward the water and break off a piece at a time. I see myself with hands against the wall of a "glacier", called Alzheimer' trying to hold it back. It can't be done, of course, but as long as June is (in her words) "Trying so hard" I won't give up.

Thanks so much for your concern for her.



MUSIC NOTES

September seems to come earlier every year! But, after a relaxing, inspiring, invigorating vacation, and the several musical conventions and conferences I participated in, I am very much looking forward to the fall, and to the year beyond. It's gonna be a GREAT year!

Organ 101: Someone asked me how pipes work in a pipe organ and suggested I explain this in the newsletter. The sequence of events for a pipe from to sound: 1) a blower blows wind (air) under pressure into a reservoir which stabilizes the air pressure. 2) Wind then goes from the reservoir into the wind chest that the pipes are mounted on. 3) There is an electronic valve below each pipe in the wind chest that will let air into the specific pipe that is actuated by pressing the key for that note sending an electronic signal to the valve. In other words, when I pull out the 8' Principal stop (the control for that rank or set of pipes. When the stop is pushed in, it stops wind from entering that wind chest - when the stop is pulled out, it allows wind into the wind chest) and play the middle "C", the valve below that pipe will open allowing the air within the wind chest to enter that pipe from that stop and make it speak or sound. The term, "pulling out all the stops", comes from the organ. When all the stops on the organ are pulled, the organ then "gives all it has" - the loudest sound possible. So, when "we" pull out all the stops, "we" give all that we have. If you have any questions, please let me know.

We are near finalization of the new façade and hope to share this with you in the next month or two. This has taken longer that I thought it would, but the end result is going to be fantastic!

As you know by now, the lights above the Choir Area have all been changed to new fixtures and LED bulbs which are supposed to last 30 years or more. Most importantly – at least for the Choir! – they will be able to see their music at night as 6 of the 12 lights had burned out! Our grateful thanks to those who contributed specifically to this project and to the Ad Council and Board of Trustees for making this a priority!

Many of our Music Groups will begin this month. Please look down the list and if you see a group you would like to participate in or have questions about, please let me know.

Chancel Choir: Thu. (beginning Sept. 3) 6:50-8:30 Open to High School age through Senior Adults who can sing on pitch and read music at least a little. No audition, but come a few minutes early to get registered and a folder with music. We have more fun than probably should be allowed, but we make some pretty good music and have a real sense of family and spirituality.

Chanters Men's Chorus: Thu. (beginning Oct. 15) 5:30-6:30 pm. Open to all men who love to sing. Directed by John Nuss, we sing in church about once per month, go caroling to a couple of assisted living facilities at Christmas time and again in the spring.

Canyon Carillon: Adult handbell Choir of experienced ringers. We rehearse on Tue. (beginning Sept. 15) 6:30-8:00pm. If you would like to join us, please call me at the church: 480-982-3776. We ring once a month plus all the major services, concerts.

Orchestra: Wed. 7:00-8:00pm (beginning Nov. 4): This group is for everyone who has played or currently plays an instrument. Our library includes many new titles all of which are scored for standard orchestra – strings, winds, brass and percussion. If you have an instrument, dust it off and come join us in November for some great music making!

Music for Children – now part of Pioneer Clubs, beginning Wed., Sept. 9. For more information, see Katharine Keller's Christian Education article in this newsletter, or call the church office. John Nuss will continue to work with these kids during Pioneer Clubs, learning music – what it is, how we do it and why it helps us praise God.





GLOBAL MISSIONS WORK TRIP 2016


The Global Missions Work Trip leaves January 16, 2016 for a week in San Jose, Costa Rica, where we will work with Rice and Beans Ministry on building projects and food ministry. The food ministry provides an amazing opportunity to visit people's homes, hear their concerns, and pray with them with the help of Costa Rican interpreters. Building projects include structures for local churches as well as home repairs. All skills are needed so long as they come with a willingness to work at whatever needs to be done. You will learn. You will be inspired. You will be deeply touched. You will bring a piece of Costa Rica home in your heart.

We fly directly from Sky Harbor to San Jose, about five hours, and stay in a large, secure home with single beds and semi-private baths. Cost of participation is your plane fare, about \$750 round trip (purchase your ticket directly), room and board of \$40 per day while in country, and a contribution of \$300 toward materials for the project (given through GCUMC). For no more than \$1,500 you can have this incredible experience!

Some participants choose to extend their time in Costa Rica, seeing additional parts of this beautiful country which boasts over 600 species of birds, seven volcanos and both Atlantic and Pacific beaches. Studies show that Costa Rica is the happiest country in the world and it's very welcoming for Americans because the water is potable throughout the country and electric power is the same as ours. No adapter is needed for your hair dryer! English is widely understood but people appreciate tourists' efforts to speak Spanish.

So give the global missions work trip prayer and consideration. Fay Quanstrom, who will be leading the trip, will be happy to talk with you further. Then watch for announcements of team meetings in the fall.

WHERE DOES THE TIME GO?

Do you sense time speeding up? I sure do! Every time I turn around another week has flown by, and that makes a point with regards to your peepers. Don't delay getting regular eye exams, wearing your sunglasses, and being proactive in your health management. The last of this article series on your "peepers" focuses on age-related Macular



Degeneration aka "AMD."

AMD is a common eye condition and a leading cause of vision loss in people over 50. It is caused by damage to the macula, a small spot near the center of the retina, which is the part of the eye that is needed for sharp, central vision allowing us to see objects that are straight ahead. When the macula becomes damaged your field of view becomes blurry, distorted or dark. AMD does not cause "complete" blindness, however, losing the ability to see with clear central vision, impacts the simplest everyday activities; cooking, driving, recognition of the faces of others, fixing things around the house, reading, and writing and other things we take for granted.

AMD includes the term "age-related" because it often occurs after the age of 60 however, it can occur earlier. Risk factors for developing AMD include:

- 1) Smoking: Research has proven that smoking doubles the risk of AMD. Is losing your sight worth your continued smoking and losing your independence?
- 2) Race: AMD is more common in Caucasians than African-Americans or Hispanic/Latinos.
- 3) Family History or Genetics: People with family history of AMD are at a greater risk. At last count there are nearly 20+ genes that can affect the risk of developing AMD. Genetic testing does not foretell your risk status. Environmental factors such as smoking and nutrition play a big part in developing this disease and there are no genetic tests that can actually "diagnose" or predict AMD with any certainty. "The American Academy of Ophthalmology currently recommends against routine genetic testing for AMD and insurance generally does not cover it."*

What can you do to reduce your risk and possibly prevent AMD? Five healthy choices you can make to improve your odds are:

- Avoid smoking
- 2. Exercise regularly
- 3. Maintain normal blood pressure and cholesterol levels
- 4. Eat a healthy diet rich in green, leafy vegetables and fish
- 5. Take daily nutritional supplements geared for eye health, such as Vitamin C (at least 500 mg), Vitamin E-400 international units, Zinc (80 mg as zinc oxide), Copper (2mg as cupric oxide), and either 15mg of beta carotene (Do not take beta-carotene-if you smoke or used to smoke) or Lutein 10mg and 2mg Zeaxanthin, Omega-3 fatty acids 1 (2000mg, a day especially if you are not a fish eater).

The AREDS and AREDS2 study trials completed by the National Eye Institute showed that a combination of these supplements can reduce risk of late AMD by 25%, but how much better would it be to proactively, prevent the disease, by making these 5 healthy choices a daily habit? Here is to better eye health and remember to give God thanks for those precious two eyes that give us the ability to see all of His creation and glorify Him for it. ~ Psalm 29:2.


Stephen Ministers are people like you who have gone through their own challenges in life, but are at the moment in a good place to assist others. They are Rainy Day People.

ORDINATION FOR WOMEN IN THE **UNITED METHODIST CHURCH**

On May 4, 1956 in Minneapolis, MN, the General Conference of the Methodist Church voted to grant women full clergy rights. (1) Many women were already serving in some places as lay pastors. This vote gave women the right to be ordained and be recognized and receive full privileges as pastors.


Methodist women had served the church since early establishment of the united Methodist Church. Women contributed to the early church in

many ways and helped the spread of Christianity. Conservatives in the church felt that the role of marriage and motherhood. women was Motherhood was considered the bedrock of church and society. Centuries of tradition decreed men in the roles of leadership and responsibility.

Even though Methodist founder, John Wesley asked women to serve as evangelists, lay preachers and leaders in other positions this was considered radical in the eighteenth century. The debate for ordination for women has existed since the eighteenth century. The vote in 1956 opened the door for women to assume roles of leadership.

The Methodist Church has always been able to adapt to change and has been an example in granting equal rights and opportunities of service to all its members regardless of sex. (2) Gender equality within the church has progressed slowly but has not yet been fully implemented. Women have to overcome gender prejudices from members of their congregation as well as from administration.

Women have answered the call to ministry in increasing numbers. Their presence and their witness has opened the church in the direction of greater outreach to the community. They have initiated new programs and new services to meet the needs of the community.


