From The Pastor: "Law of the Harvest"

Marshall Shelley, editor of *Leadership Journal*, wrote once about his father-in-law and his attitude about being thankful for what you have been given.

"My wife's father is a Kansas farmer. He's spent a lifetime raising wheat, corn, milo, beef, and along the way some sheep and chickens. One morning while I followed him around the farm, we talked about the differences between city living and a rural lifestyle.

"Most city folks I know expect each year to be better than the last," he said. "They think it's normal to get an annual raise, to earn more this year than you did last year. As a farmer, I have good years and bad years. It all depends on rain at the right time, dry days for harvest, and no damaging storms. Some years we have less.""

Many of our church members have strong roots in farming. You know all about the "law of the harvest." I am sure you thought there were times when you might not survive those lean years. Yet, I have to admit I have had more the mindset of a city dweller who thinks differently.

I was impressed by the Kansas farmer's attitude. I think he is right. There are lean years and there are years of plenty. And in November we try to remember to give thanks for whatever we have been given. It is also a reminder in those years of plenty to prepare for years of little. This is the goal of the sermon series, 7 Habits of Effective Christians. I hope you are putting into practice some of the spiritual disciplines we have talked about so that your faith might see you through the lean times.



Healthy Living

News from the Health and Wellness Ministry of Monica Ortega-Watters and Susan Malloy, Parish Nurses

Greetings! Fall is in the air and it is the season for a variety of changes & events. For most older adults it is the time to make decisions about your healthcare. Please be advised that the dates have changed for you to make those tough decisions regarding Medicare Part A & B plus your Part D Drug benefits.

This Open Enrollment opportunity to change plans began October 15 and ends December 7,2011 NOT December 31, 2011 as in previous years.

Having participated in a teleconference with 7000 Arizonians on October 4th with the guest expert Herb Schultz, Regional Director of the US Department of Health & Human Services (DHHS), I was afforded the information about the new health care law below.

One new coverage area that was effective in 2011 for those with original Medicare is the Preventative/Wellness Benefits that includes a **ONCE** a year Wellness visit with your Primary Care MD without the usual COPAY. You must specify with your MD office that is a Preventative/Wellness Office visit. Many Physicians office are NOT aware of this benefit. This gives you the opportunity to discuss whatever you are concerned about with regard to your health and any potential conditions in the future. From talks about cancer, cardiovascular disease, stroke issues, medical nutritional help, and cholesterol issues, this one visit is your chance to talk with your provider.

The new Preventative coverage benefit also includes a screening Mammogram, screening Prostate exam, Screening Bone density study (for both males & females), and Colonscopy screening for colon cancer, just to name a few, **without** a \$150.00 COPAY. For full details of the preventative services available, check your *2012 Medicare and You Handbook*, page 3. For folks who have a Medicare Advantage Plan these benefits go into effect January 2012.

Finally, after years of trying to get the Federal Government to realize that prevention is key to reducing health care costs they are coming to grips with this concept. Hopefully, over time, this will

help reduce the tremendous amount of money into the Billions of dollars of costs to treat diabetes, cancer, and cardiovascular disease.

I also want to bring to your attention that if you have the misfortune of hitting the Part D "donut hole" with regard to your prescription drugs before the end of the year for 2011, you should only be paying 50% of the cost of brand name drugs. There is a 7% discount going up to 14% in 2012 for Generics. So be sure you check with your pharmacists about this. If you have concerns and do not feel you have gotten your prescriptions at that amount of discount while in the donut hole you can call DHHS 1-800-432-4040 and get assistance in making that happen with your Pharmacist. If you are an AARP member, you can call 1-866-389-5649, email them at azaarp@aarp.org or go to the website www.aarp.org.

If you are keeping your current policies for both Medicare and Part D then you need to do nothing. If you wish to change to a different plan this must be completed by December 7, 2011.Don't let the time slip away and wait too long to dig into the information so you can get the plan you want. "He who hesitates is lost".

For "Newbies" into the Medicare system –ask questions, get help, and even if you do not use many/ any medications, start the Plan D Drug plan as you will be penalized later if you don't. Don't you just love our Federal government? Oh that is for a later article.

International Missions

"The world is my parish." - John Wesley

"...We will strive to be a church that serves our community and the world, realizing and sharing the satisfying and abundant life Christ brings to all people."

Our efforts to assist people around the world take many forms. The International Missions team continues to provide an opportunity to help through our sales of Fair Trade Coffee. When you purchase Green Parrot Coffee, you are assisting Fellow Man International in Honduras. When you purchase Equal Exchange coffee, tea and cocoa, you are helping farmers from various countries. Details of the Equal Exchange organization, taken directly from their website follow:

Equal Exchange currently works with small farmer organizations in Africa, Asia, Latin America and the United States. Our trading partners are small farmer cooperatives - businesses owned and governed democratically by the farmers themselves. Decisions are made within the co-op, on their terms.

Training programs for women in Guatemala, an ecotourism project



in Nicaragua, new classrooms in El Salvador - these are all examples of the initiatives that co-ops have taken in their own communities with the income and support of Equal Exchange and other Fair Trade organizations. These farmer co-ops help keep rural communities healthy and strong, and keep local cultures vibrant.

Why do we think it's important to partner with farmer co-operatives?

After over 25 years of working with small-scale growers in rural areas around the world we believe more strongly than ever that farmer co-ops are one of the best tools yet devised to address the long-standing economic, commercial, environmental, even political problems commonly found in the country-side of developing countries. This is because farmer co-ops can:

- **Provide the strength of numbers.** For example, whereas one farmer, earning maybe \$500/year, could never buy a truck or build a warehouse or processing mill, a thousand farmers working together can do all that and more. By combining their resources and energies, previously isolated farmers can become the owners of a substantial enterprise that enables them to take more control over their economic lives, strengthen their position in the marketplace, and increase their options.
- Enable farmers to gain organic certification and access to the global organic market. A single small-farmer cannot afford to pay \$2,000+ or more annually for organic certification, but when that cost is shared it becomes quite viable. In fact, most of the world's organic coffee and cocoa today is grown and exported by small farmer co-operatives.
- Help farmers improve their quality. A co-op can have the resources to train members of the community in quality control and to build the testing labs required to ensure consistently high quality. This, too, would be out of the reach of one small farmer.
- Level the local political landscape. Traditionally, in rural areas in developing countries a few powerful land-holding families, merchants or foreign corporations dominate local politics and it is hard for farmers or farm workers to get the attention and assistance of their own governments. We've seen this change considerably when the farmers organize themselves and over time build their co-operatives into significant enterprises. Governors and other officials who previously ignored the farmers begin to visit the communities, listen to the farmers requests, and even compete for their votes. The public services provided to the community begin to improve, and so on.

It is heartening to know that simply by buying a bag of coffee, you are supporting the hard work and improving the quality of life for a small farmer and his or her family somewhere in the world.

Thinking Theologically

On October 10, we held our first *Bible Banter* at the coffee house down the street. Ten of us gathered that morning to enjoy coffee and a lively conversation about what it means to be strong in the Lord. The biblical text we discussed was Joshua 1:1-9, in which God instructs Joshua, the appointed leader of the Israelites after Moses' death, to send the troops into the Promised Land. "Be strong and courageous" God says to Joshua. "Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go." (v.9, NIV)

When was the last time you were afraid or discouraged? For me, it was just last week! As I looked at my calendar and realized how much I had to do in just a few short weeks to submit my application to the Board of Ordained Ministry, when I looked at my growing "to do" list and saw how much had not yet gotten done, I became afraid and discouraged. And usually when I'm afraid and discouraged, my brain shuts down and I don't know where to begin. I forget that there is a higher power on which I can rely. I forget that God is with me. I forget that "I can do everything through Christ, who gives me strength" (Philippians 4:13, NLT). And most of all, I forget to pray.

During that first *Bible Banter*, we talked about what it meant to be strong and courageous. What I came away with was this: Even though I know in my heart that God is always with me, sometimes I forget in my head. So I need constant reminders that no matter what the journey or the circumstances, God is always with me.

I think I'm going to write myself a note and tape it to my bathroom mirror that says "God is with you, just like Joshua. Be strong and courageous." Perhaps I'll get on my knees and pray. Or maybe I'll just head down to the coffee shop for another round of *Bible Banter* with my friends from the GCUMC neighborhood. Will you join us?

Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding (Proverbs 3:5a)



A Note From Bob...

For the first time, I am co-author of a children's book, soon to be published.

The book is titled, "When Grandma Forgets" and is meant to help children cope with a family member who has Alzheimer's Disease. The primary author is Maryann Makekau, who has a series of what she calls "Little Pink Books" for children dealing with serious topics such as cancer and parents being deployed to war.

Maryann contacted me with a request to write an endorsement of her book, "When Mother's Cancer Doesn't Go Away." In the course of our conversations, we decided to do a book together about Alzheimer's.

Here is an excerpt from my dedication page in the book:

"I first saw the effects of Alzheimer's disease up close and personal in the person of my wife's father, Ira Meeks. I had known Ira since I was 14 years old and became his daughter's boyfriend. Ira was a rugged outdoorsman, a skilled hunter and the driver of an 18 wheel truck, piled high with hay. He taught me how to shoot a high-powered rifle, took me on hunting trips where we camped out under the stars and let me drive his great truck. Then, he changed. First, he would only stay in his own neighborhood, then his own backyard. In time, he had to be confined to a memory care facility. He lost all dignity and we lost him to the forest of confusion that is Alzheimer's.

Fifteen years after his death, my wife, June, began to show signs of memory loss. It was our grown children who urged me to have her memory tested. It turned out she did, indeed, have the beginnings of memory impairment. Over the past 7 years, it has progressed to a full diagnosis of Alzheimer's. Our grandchildren and great grandchildren now have a grandma who forgets

June has always been my hero as she conquered many of life's greatest challenges. This fight is the toughest of all. I am in awe of her awareness, even of being unaware, and her determination to not give in."
