From The Pastor: "The Mind of Christ"

On one of our youth service projects a couple of years ago, I was participating in a devotional at my work site with a team of five youth. During our conversation one teenage girl said, "I don't

think we can know Jesus." My rebuttal was to ask, "Have you ever read the Gospels in the Bible?" "No," was her answer. I then suggested she might read the Gospel of Matthew and see if she began to discover some insight into whom Jesus is. Most of us have learned a great deal about Jesus from reading the New Testament section of the Bible.

Sometimes we learn about Jesus and think that we have done all that is necessary. We know his teachings and his beliefs and we have faith that he is the Son of God. We have purchased fire insurance. We have done enough to get into heaven. If we have enough information to get into heaven, then why go further? The Apostle Paul reminds us that discipleship is more than just knowledge. It is incorporating Jesus' beliefs into our lives. In Philippians 2:1-11 Paul wrote that we should have the same mind as was in Christ Jesus. This is a tough challenge. To be like Jesus takes some willingness to change and be like Jesus in thought and action. I notice that Jesus never said, learn about me. Jesus simply said, "Follow me". The upcoming Lenten season is a great time to recommit ourselves to follow Him. We can commit ourselves to having the same mind as He did.

To help us get a grip on Jesus' thoughts and ideas we will focus our seven week Lenten sermon series this year on some of the key themes that Jesus tried to get his listeners to understand. During this series Jody Topping will also lead a study group

through the same topic during the week it is preached on Sunday morning. I hope you will take advantage of both opportunities. May you take on the mind of Christ.



Our Church History

"History of Our Church Music Program"

When the Gold Canyon United Methodist Church moved into the Gold Canyon Elementary School the music for the congregation was provided on the piano by Lou Beaulieu, who also directed the singing. A choir was started in the school with just a half dozen singing with our first Choir Director, Beth O'Hara. After a couple of changes in the

director, Mary Ann Warren came on board. She was an enthusiastic recruiter and director and the choir started growing. She also recruited Nancy (Bauman) Virden to play the piano. After we moved into the Fellowship Building (our first building) the choir expanded even faster. We completely filled the risers with about eighty choir members. We received a generous donation of a beautiful Roger Organ which would be sufficient when we finally moved into the larger Sanctuary. In 2000, Linda Jones joined the music team as an additional pianist and organist. In 2003, after ten years of directing, Mary Ann Warren decided to retire and move to Twin Falls, Idaho.

Our church had acquired hand bells and started a handbell choir. Mary Ann Warren then recommended for her replacement a friend of hers, Doug Benton, the one who had sold us the handbells. Doug was an accomplished choir director and organist as well as handbell choir director. This meant that we had a music person who could wear a number of hats in our music program.

When we moved into our large Sanctuary, the organ was re-located and connected to the speakers located around the room. We also acquired a beautiful Petrov (nine foot three inch) concert grand piano at half price, with the other half being a gift from the seller. Our church has been very fortunate in receiving many gifts dedicated to the music program in addition to donations raised from the many free concerts Doug Benton has scheduled at the church.



Music Notes

As we approach Spring, we think of the beauty of desert flowers, the scent of citrus in the air (at least until allergies attack!) and warmer weather, though we certainly have

had a couple of months of "Chamber of Commerce" weather in January and February. We also look forward to our mountain (Superstition) becoming green

again, and going through all the colors during sunrise and sunset.

These little gifts from God are some of the reasons we have chosen to live in this place at this time. These gifts are not necessarily asked for, they are – and have always been – just little blessings given to us by our great God! What can we ourselves do to be more like God? To have more of a mind-set like Christ Jesus?

Our first concert of the month, is our annual **Spring Concert** on **Sunday, March 4 at 3:00 pm.** This program will feature the Chancel Choir, Chancel Ringers, Joyful Noise, Chanters, Women's Choir and Orchestra. Also featured will be the Agape Brass Quintet, *Continued on next page*—>

Linda Jones, Marty Robison, Nancy Virden and I will also be featured on the Rodgers Organ and Petrof Piano. We hope you will come and enjoy an afternoon of great music! No charge, a freewill offering will be received.

Have you ever wished to be in the presence of True Greatness - like basketball great Michael Jordan or perhaps Steve Jobs or Mahatma Gandhi? I had such an experience, totally unexpected, at the National Convention of the American Guild of Organists in Washington, D.C. in 2010. It was Wednesday, July 7, during the hottest summer Washington D. C. had had in a hundred years, well over 100-degrees, with nearly the same humidity! Our bus got to St. Patrick Roman Catholic Church just before the concert started and there was no room to sit, except along the air conditioning vents circumventing the altar space, which, as you can imagine, was pumping out very cold air! Not real comfortable. I even considered skipping this recital, but then the organist began, and I was blown away! I could see her from where I sat as the organ was in the rear balcony. She ripped through her first piece and received thunderous applause! When she stood up to bow, I thought, "she's must be in high school"! Here's this tiny woman in total command of this large pipe organ, playing a very difficult program effortlessly, musically and all from memory! (She is young, having earned her Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the Julliard School last year.) The standing ovation she received at the end was immediate, and so long the ushers finally started pushing us outside so we would not be late to our next event.

Of the very many concerts I heard I was so impressed with her I immediately booked her for a concert here as soon as I got back. That concert was last year. I was even more impressed with her performance here last year, so I booked her again for this year. She was so impressed with our organ ("This is perhaps the best installation of a digital organ I've ever played!"), she agreed to the same fee, even though her fee had substantially increased.

Isabelle Demers, that organist, has been referred to as "diminutive dynamo", "petit powerhouse" and "true greatness" by her critics and is now one of the most sought after concert organists in North America. Indeed, Isabelle Demers is a force of nature that *La Presse* in Montreal attributed "vehement virtuosity". She performs for us here on **Sunday, March 19 at 3:00 pm**.

This will be a busy month for her. March 4 she performs at Davies Symphony Hall in San Francisco; March 11 at Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church, Landisville, PA; March 16 at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, Akron, OH; then comes to Gold Canyon, rehearses all day Saturday, performs on Sunday, does a workshop for the Central Arizona Chapter of the American Guild of Organists on Monday, then goes to LA to perform on the famous Walt Disney Concert Hall Organ on March 25 (Google this organ – you will be amazed at what it looks like!). And that is just March! This summer she will tour throughout England and Germany. You can

find her on the web at isabelledemers.org

Her concert is open to the public at no charge, a freewill offering will be received. Her concert has already been paid for so all of the proceeds from this concert will go toward the purchase of genuine wind-blown pipes to be added to our Rodgers digital organ. Come experience True Greatness! You will be very glad you did. Bring your family, your friends and your neighbors. They will also be very glad you did!

As always, everyone is asked to please bring at least one non-perishable food item per person for the GCUMC Food Bank to these concerts (see list in the Sunday Bulletin for what is needed). Bring your family, friends and neighbors. These programs are a great way to share your church, and the many gifts God has given, with others.

Our annual trek to Organ Stop Pizza with Lew Wil*liams* will be on *Wed. March 7 at 11:00 am.* The cost is the same as last year, \$7.50 per person (cash only – there is an ATM in the lobby) which includes the program by Lew, one of, if not the greatest theater organist in the world, Pizza buffet, salad and tax. Drinks are on your own. Those who live in Gold Canyon, meet at the church at 10:15 and we will take the bus and carpool. Those who want to drive there, it is located at 1149 E Southern Ave, Mesa, southwest corner of Southern and Stapley, west of Walgreens. Doors open at 10:45 am. Before going in, be sure to walk around the outside of the building to the front and see the monstrous 32' Contra Diaphone (wood) and 32' Contra Tuba (metal) pipes in the front of the building! Sign up sheets are in the narthex of both buildings. I need to call in a head count shortly after the 1st, so please sign as soon as possible.

Speaking of organ, please remember that we are accepting donations for the Organ Pipe Fund. We need \$350,000 which includes 11 sets of Fratelli Ruffatti pipes (600+ actual wind-blown pipes!), renovation of the Choir area for the pipes, and bringing the electronic speakers down from above the Choir to intersperse with the pipes, allowing the entire organ to speak freely, and not so focused. If you would like to make a substantial donation to the Organ Pipe Fund and/or have any questions, please let Pastor Fred know or me know. To date, we have over \$10,000.

If you can read music, sing on pitch and would like to come sing with the Choir, play an instrument in the Orchestra, or join one of our other groups, please give me a call at the church or just come to a rehearsal, but come a few minutes early so we can meet and get you registered. All of our groups are open and are looking forward to having **you** with us!

Greetings again!

In January we started on an interesting subject, "How the Brain Forms New Habits", from a seminar I attended late last year. We side stepped a bit to provide the reminder of February being Healthy Heart Month. I hope you will tuck that information away just in case you find yourself in the throes of a heart attack. I guess my point would be don't go down the river of "DENIAL" because the consequences could be deadly. Enough said.

On a more positive note, getting from bad habits to good ones takes fortitude and perseverance. Having GOALS at the beginning of the year includes a start and finish date. Whereas, SETTING RESOLU-TIONS, allows you to "resolve" to change your behavior and affect a permanent change. Big difference and more lasting positive outcome are the result. One of mine for 2012 is that I resolve to get 8 hours of sleep each night. It looks like a goal, but is in fact a resolution. This is because it is a continuous, nonstop goal; is set with the intention of fulfillment each night until it becomes a (good) habit; and thus becomes ingrained in my daily routine. GCUMC Permanent Endowment Fund

The Gold Canyon United Methodist Church has a Permanent Endowment Fund which was established several years ago. Did you know that it is possible to make a difference in the ministry of GCUMC even after you are gone? Gifts to the GCUMC Permanent Endowment Fund are invested and in turn only the gains are used to further the missions and ministries of the Church. The principal of the gift is held in perpetuity. This is a wonderful way for any donor to make a difference for many years into the future. The Permanent Endowment Committee has designated the income to be used for Buildings and Property; Scholarships, especially for those entering the ministry; Missions; and Undesignated. Undesignated can mean that a donor may select where he or she wishes the income to be used or leave it up to the Committee to decide. There is a generous donor who has given gifts over the past few years to the Endowment Fund, which were specifically given for the income to be used for scholarships. This income has provided the funds for the scholarships which the church has given to various members.

The Permanent Endowment can become a strong supporter of the Church and its missions, but only if members and others of the congregation remember the Fund with gifts at any time or with estate bequests of any size.

You may give a one-time or recurring donation online by logging on to our church website at www.goldcanyonumc.org and selecting "Click to Give". You will then be guided through the steps to get set up. It's easy and convenient!

Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT)

Save time, simplify your life, and support our church! In this new millennium the church is keeping up with the times by offering our givers a new way to help our ministry. Our new electronic contribution program is an automatic funds transfer program that will allow you to make contributions without having to lift a pen to write a check or reach into your wallet for cash!

Here is how it works: you authorize a specified amount of money to be electronically transferred directly from your checking or savings account to the church's account. You can also specify the frequency of the transfer to allow you to keep your check register up to date.

It is fast, safe, and easy! In fact, it is less risky than checks, as it cannot be lost, stolen, or destroyed in the mail, and the rate of accuracy is high. The electronic transfer will cost you NOTHING and you save the cost of the check. The church will issue you a donation statement for your records, and bank statements will provide you with a record of transfer as additional proof of your contributions. Donations via electronic transfer can be made to our general fund or our building fund. Designations to Missions or the Pastors Discretionary Fund can also be made. Of course you can cancel your authorization of transfer at any time by notifying us in writing. We believe that once you have enjoyed the convenience and savings of this new program, you won't want to go back. Contact the church office now.

Thinking Theologically — By Jody Topping, Pastoral Intern

Have you ever been disappointed by something or someone? Maybe you were disappointed when you weren't offered what you thought was the perfect job, or perhaps your disappointment came from something a friend or family member did...or didn't do. Disappointment is a fact of life, and for some of us, those little (or big) disappointments in life can make or break our overall well-being. Sometimes disappointments, especially if they are allowed to build up, lead to physical or mental illness, depression or anxiety. Sometimes they lead to broken relationships. One thing is sure: if we allow our disappointments to fester, they will take control of our lives.

Over the last few weeks, I've been dealing with what I originally thought was a huge disappointment. At the end of January I interviewed with the Board of Ordained Ministry to be recommended for Commissioning as part of my journey toward Ordination. Going into the interviews I was nervous but fairly confident that they would approve my request for Commissioning. But at the end of a long day of interviews, the Board voted to continue my status as a Certified Candidate for Ministry. They told me of several things they want me to do over the next 12 months and if all goes well, I will meet with them again in a year.

As I left the church where the interviews were held, my heart was heavy with disappointment. For a moment, I even doubted my call. After all, God has been leading me toward this goal, right? Every other time I said "yes" to God, doors were opened and opportunities to grow in ministry presented themselves. So how could the Board not see that I was ready (at least in my own eyes) to be a Pastor in a church?

It's amazing what disappointment can do – how the negative self-talk takes over our thought processes and causes us to question the things we thought we knew and understood with great clarity. This was certainly the case for me: when the Board said "not yet," what I originally heard was "no," and it took me several weeks to figure out that what I had heard was wrong.

When we are faced with disappointment, the best thing we can do is turn to God in prayer. This was certainly my first instinct. And it was through my conversations with God that I was led to seek comfort in the Scriptures. One of my favorites comes from Paul's letter to the Philippians, where he writes "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God" (Phil 4:6). Clearly Paul is telling us that we need to rely upon God *especially* when disappoint-

ment floods our lives and our souls. Relying on God helps us keep things in perspective, and helps us see clearly what God wants us to do and be. Relying on God helps us work through the disappointments in our lives so we can be stronger. Yet another scripture that I am finding especially helpful right now comes from the prophet Jeremiah, who writes "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope" (Jer 29:11). God knows what the future holds for each of us, and I think that sometimes what we perceive as road-blocks are actually just bumps in the road.

Now that I've had a few weeks to process my own disappointment, I understand that God's plans are not my own. Perhaps this is God's way of telling me to relax and take some time to grow as both a Christian and as a future church pastor. Perhaps God has other plans for me at this time in my life and is leading me to continue doing ministry here in this church. Whatever God's plans are, I think the most important thing we must do is to stop, pray, and listen for what God is laying on our hearts and how God is working in our lives...even when we are faced with disappointments.

I am thankful that God is working with me through my disappointment. I pray you too will look for the ways God is at work through your own disappointments to bring you closer to God. Amen.

I was recently reminded of a Gospel story about Jesus healing a man who suffered from leprosy. Jesus had just given a very powerful speech on the side of a hill. That speech included what we now call "The Beatitudes." It was a long speech, filled with passion. Even after spending so much time sharing himself with the com-

munity, Jesus was willing to heal one who asked.

I am working on a collection of short stories — actually more like vignettes — about people who were healed by Jesus. When I heard this story the other day, I thought about the story I wrote called "The Leper." This month, I am going to share the beginning of this story with you. It will run as a serial in two parts. Please feel free to let me know what you think. So, without further adieu, here is the first installment of "The Leper:"

The Leper

The young man walked slowly away from the only place he knew now as home. As he moved through the noisy streets, children scattered, leaving behind the small footprints of play. Their leftover laughter reverberated among the close-walled buildings, echoing in a never-ending reminder of his anguish. The house he had just left was filled with others like him, unwanted, unwashed and weary. Any other person, standing back in the shadows and watching him pass, would think him old, much older than his years. Bent and misshapen, he limped every other step. He wore a tattered robe, hood pulled up over his head and hanging into his face. From a distance, he seemed a ghoul except for the look of melancholy that hung about his eyes. There was no malice in this man, only a deep sense of sadness as he hobbled upon toeless feet. His hands were bent like old tree branches; the bones were thinned down and the distal ends had already begun to dissolve within. Of course, he had no thought of how his finger-bones curled and slowly degenerated; he only knew the pain of his necrotic flesh, the feel of the wounds that festered beneath his extra-large hood. Ancient he seemed, like a withered cedar on a drought drained hill.

There had been a time, not so long ago, that this man had a name and a family. Joseph ben Abraham had once been a successful baker in the village. He had a robust and jolly wife to share his life, and three young children. Not yet thirty, he had not reached his age of wisdom, but he had become respected among the men. Like most other men of his village, Joseph had studied scripture since he was a young boy. He had ideas about the meaning of things, and he held his own in the constant discussion that took place in the corners of the Synagogue in the after-dinner evenings.

How he had enjoyed walking those nights alone, having kissed his two daughters and his son good night, squeezed Rebekkah tightly and left her to clean up the dinner mess and tuck the children into bed. The warm breezes always made him stop and think about the sacredness of all; he thought of the breath of the Most High that gave life into the smallest creatures. Some of his thoughts he kept to himself, for he never knew if they might sound silly to the old men chattering beside the Synagogue about the Law.

Now things had changed. He had gotten sick and before long it was clear that he had been cursed. He had become so ugly – a monster who could never again speak to his own children for fear that they too would be cursed with this horrible affliction. This night, he was making a trek toward his home - the home he would never again enter. He had heard the children playing in the streets and thought of his own. His heart had twisted in spasms of pain and anger at his predicament. Why had this happened to him? He had gotten up from his chair, and donning the hooded cloak that acted as a mediocre disguise, had passed through the open door into the evening. It was his new presence in the alleyway that had chased the children away. They feared him, thought him "unclean," believed that they too might catch this disintegrating disease. With no thought for his utter loneliness, children scattered like so many cockroaches. Adults were not so far behind. Now here he was across the street from the home his heart inhabited. He could see Rebekkah's profile as she trimmed the lamp-wicks so they would be ready for the evening. It was not yet the Sabbath, so Rebekkah would be planning a busy evening of mending before imparting the wise words of scripture to the children and scooting them off to bed. Joseph stood in the shadows across the street and watched. From somewhere to his left, the direction from which he had come, there was laughter and the sound of running feet. He receded further into the darkness as he watched his son and youngest daughter come running past and right into the building before him. His heart flipped and settled in deeper darkness as he wondered if his children had been among those who had run from him only minutes before. Sighing, he leaned against the shadowed wall. Standing in contemplation, it seemed to Joseph ben Abraham that for one long moment time was suspended. Silence surrounded him, enclosing him like the womb. This was not an empty silence, but the pregnant silence of holiness: he was not alone. Confused, he lifted his eyes and found himself locked in visual contact with a man he had never seen before.

There are established criteria that must be met before a potential recipient may receive any available funds. Brochures describing the criteria, along with more details about the program, are available in the "Information Rack" found in the church narthex.



A Care Receiver is one with a need which is born of some stress, grief, or personal problem which compromises the ordinary joy of living. A Stephen Minister's caregiving is born of, and dependent upon, the eternal and all-inclusive love of God. Both have important boundaries which are to be maintained if the caring relationship is to flourish.

A Stephen Minister is trained to recognize, and will not intrude upon or violate, the boundaries of one who is troubled. If such a person is unable or so deeply hurt that he or she is unable to set or maintain boundaries, the Stephen Minister can help with decision making, build trust, demonstrate values, teach the art of saying "no", relieve anxiety and feelings of anger, and help one discover that God is a loving God upon whom everyone may depend for answers through worship, prayer and fellowship with Christians.

If you are overly sensitive to criticism, feel responsible for the feelings of other people, tend to take on the moods of those around you, frequently feel angry or sad, and regularly feel anxious or afraid, OR IF YOU NEED SOMEONE TO TALK WITH, please call the office for the help of a Stephen Minister.

Give me, Lord, a stout heart to bear my own burdens, a tender heart to bear the burdens of others and a believing heart to lay all my burdens on You, for You care for us.

SCRIP/BUS FUND

know?????..... Over the past ten years, **at no cost to participants**, the church bus fund has earned over \$104,000 from the *Scrip* program (\$85,000 from Bashas', \$18,000 from Fry's). This is fantastic!! This money was used to purchase our bus and pay for gas, insurance and maintenance.

Now that we need to purchase a fifteen passenger **van** to accompany our bus (we are about \$10,000 short to buy this van before the youth go on their Mission Project to Busby, Montana this summer), we are asking *all* of you who shop at these two stores to reconsider using a Bashas' Community Support card and/or Fry's Gift card purchased at the church Information Desk on Sunday mornings or at the church office during the week. Each card starts with \$20, \$50 or \$100, and you recharge it as often as necessary just before you check out at the store (or at Customer Service), using your personal charge card, a check or cash; then use the card to pay for your purchases, and you can even use it for gas at Fry's!

Bashas' gives the church 6% of every dollar you load onto the card, Fry's 3%. Bashas' cards are honored at Bashas' grocery stores, A.J.'s Fine Foods and Food City. Fry's cards are accepted at Fry's grocery stores, Fry's Marketplace, and all other Kroger-owned stores throughout the US.

For many of you who in the past only used the "number program" at Bashas' which was a separate program and only earned 1%, be advised that it has not been in place for the past two years since they had to make a choice of their charitable programs at that time.
