

prayer life is inadequate. How would it change your life to be immersed in prayer?

Emma Daniel Gray died on June 8, 2009, at the age of 95. There was a big story about her in the Washington Post because for 24 years she was the woman who cleaned the office of the President of the United States. She served six presidents until she retired in 1979. Her official title was Charwoman.

What made the story even more interesting was that Mrs. Gray was a devout Christian. She would stand and pray over the President's chair each time she dusted it - her cleaning supplies in one hand, the other on the chair. She'd pray for blessings, wisdom, and safety.

I am comforted by the thought that somebody prayed over the President's Oval Office chair. Emma made use of an opportunity for prayer. I know there are many times I missed an opportunity to pray. I just didn't think about it. Yet through the years I have tried to become more and more intentional about praying. And when I do so it changes me.

I know that many of us have questions about prayer. In July and August we will focus on prayer on Sunday mornings. We will deal with unanswered prayer and how to pray more effectively. We will understand how the prayer life of Moses can help us and how Jesus showed us better ways to pray. I pray you will join us

Standing on the Rock - Literally!





Of course, it was hard to see through all the smoke! Oh well. I still make some pretty good burgers, but will probably have to go to Texas Roadhouse for good ribs from now on! We all have our gifts!

I would like to lift up two very special people in our traditional music ministry. The first one is **Cynthia**Hoff, Assistant Director of Special Music. In this role, Cindy has taken on the job of getting singers and other musicians to share their talents during the Offertories at the 8:00 and 9:30 services. This is not as easy as it may sound as our Worship Committee tries very hard - and is very committed - to matching all the music from beginning to end to the theme of Pastor Fred's sermons. Cindy's knowledge of classical and contemporary Christian solo/ensemble music has really helped to keep the Offertory in sync with the service. She is an excellent voice teacher/coach at Chandler/Gilbert Community College. When you see her, please tell her how much you appreciate the great job she is doing!

The other special person is truly my right hand in the form of **Dottie House**, **Music Librarian**. She has served in this capacity since before we moved into the Sanctuary in 2005. She has truly done an incredible job of keeping our music straight, matching a former soprano's folder to a new soprano (and the same for the other parts) and gently reminding people, who have perhaps forgotten, to turn in their music. She stamps, numbers and hole punches all new music, and, has often had to climb a 12' ladder (literally!) to reach the newest music on the top shelves of our Music Library! Most importantly, she has kept me organized and, fairly sane! She has let me bounce different ideas and possibilities off her and has always been very honest and open in her responses – something I really value!

Unfortunately, at least for me, Dottie has decided to retire effective August 1. This date will indeed be the end of an era! I have asked those whom I know have the requisite organizational and people skills to do this job and make everyone feel welcome and at home in the Choir. So far, everyone has said something like, "Dottie is too perfect. I could never fill her shoes". Well, ya know, I love Dottie, and indeed, she has been the perfect Music Librarian – and friend! – but I am not looking for someone to "fill her shoes". Besides, I'll bet her shoes are only a size 4!

Fortunately, we are completely gutting the Music Library and starting from scratch re-designing the entire room so the Music Library will be much more efficient. We have ordered seven units of Wenger's 7-shelf Music Library System. Each unit is like the big, rolling, multi-shelf units doctors use to house their patient files. No more climbing up the big ladder! All the music we have now, plus future titles will be easily accessible from the floor, or at most, a step stool. We are now going to have space for the 600+ Choral titles, 250+ Handbell Titles, 30+ Orchestral titles, and associated brass and other instrumental parts that we already have, and space to add several hundred more titles of each in the future.

Dottie has been instrumental in this process. I mention all this in hopes that someone who has an interest in keeping the library up to date, has great people skills, and 3-4 hours/week available to maintain the library, will come forward to explore the possibilities of sharing their talents with us. I keep track of all our music and musicians on FilemakerPro data bases on my iMac. If someone is familiar with Mac and FilemakerPro, that is a plus. If not, that's fine too. I am hoping and praying that someone with an interest in music, that also has great organizational skills and people skills will come forward and talk with me about this unique job. If I don't find the right person by August 1, then I get to do this by myself, which I can do, but would rather use my talents in other ways and give someone else this opportunity. If you would like to consider this, please give me a call. *Please!*

I mentioned last month that I will be inducted into the Area 11, Handbell Musicians of America, *Ring of Fame* in June. I am writing this article the week before I leave, hopefully I can post some pictures of the event in the August RoadRunner. Unfortunately, no one from my family can be there with me, but, there is one person from the church who will be there, **Nancy Bradshaw** from the Chancel Choir. Hopefully she will say a few words about this event in the August RoadRunner as well. Established in 2006, *Ring of Fame* has inducted only 7 people to date.

I hope and pray everyone who travels through this great country and indeed the world, will spend a lot of time appreciating the beauty God has placed around us. Smell the roses, the coffee, the pine trees, the sea, feel the spray of water from the falls, reel in the "big one" (or at least enjoy telling about the "big one" that got away!), and enjoy the color contrasts between the clear blue sky and green mountains, blue water, colorful flowers, etc. Enjoy life, and thank God!

GCUMC Permanent Endowment Fund

The Gold Canyon United Methodist Church has a Permanent Endowment Fund which was established several years ago. Did you know that it is possible to make a difference in the ministry of GCUMC even after you are gone? Gifts to the GCUMC Permanent Endowment Fund are invested and in turn only the gains are used to further the missions and ministries of the Church. The principal of the gift is held in perpetuity. This is a wonderful way for any donor to make a difference for many years into the future. The Permanent Endowment Committee has designated the income to be used for Buildings and Property; Scholarships, especially for those entering the ministry; Missions; and Undesignated. Undesignated can mean that a donor may select where he or she wishes the income to be used or leave it up to the Committee to decide. There is a generous donor who has given gifts over the past few years to the Endowment Fund, which were specifically given for the income to be used for scholarships which the church has in turn given to various members.

The Permanent Endowment can become a strong supporter of the Church and its missions, but only if members and others of the congregation remember the Fund with gifts at any time or with estate bequests of any size. Please consider gifts to support the Endowment and GCUMC. SCRIP/BUS FUND ~

Did you know?????..... Over the past ten years, at no cost to participants, the church bus fund has earned over \$104,000 from the Scrip program (\$86,000 from Bashas', \$18,000 from Fry's). This is fantastic!! This money was used to purchase our bus and pay for gas, insurance and maintenance. No w that we need to purchase a fifteen passenger van to accompany our bus we are asking all of you who shop at these two stores to consider using a Bashas' Community Support card and/or Fry's Gift card purchased at the church Information Center on Sunday mornings or at the church office during the week. Each card starts with \$20, \$50 or \$100, and you recharge it as often as necessary just before you check out at the store (or at Customer Service), using your personal charge card, a check or cash; then use the card to pay for your purchases, and you can even use it for gas at Fry's! Bashas' gives the church 6% of every dollar you load onto the card, Fry's 3%. Bashas' cards are honored at Bashas' grocery stores, A.J.'s Fine Foods and Food City. Fry's cards are accepted at Fry's grocery stores, Fry's Marketplace, and all other Kroger-owned stores throughout the US. Many of you in the past only used the "number program" at Bashas' which was a separate program - this program was discontinued about two years ago due to economic conditions. One of the most important things I learned as a Stephen Ministry student was how to listen. Anyone who knows me for more than a day can tell you that once you get me talking, it's virtually impossible to shut me up. As a survivor of domestic violence, it can be easy for me to get caught up in discussion with others who have shared my experience. It is always good to know that you aren't alone.

It isn't good, though, if you are in a crisis and you need to talk to someone who cares and they keep talking about their own troubles, even if they are similar to your experiences. What you need in such a time is someone who can understand, but who can also just sit quietly while you share your innermost heart. That's what a Stephen Minister can do. A Stephen Minister can be there for you. A Stephen Minister can pray with you, if that's what you want, though they will not force prayer upon you. A Stephen Minister can help you know that you are not alone.

A Stephen Minister is not an alternative to counseling, but they can be a good addition to a care team, with the agreement of the care receiver and his or her counselor.

If you think a Stephen Minister might meet your needs, or even if you just wonder if they might, give us a call in the church office at 480-982-3776. You can ask for me - I promise I'll shut up and listen!

International Missions

A Look at the United Methodist Committee on Relief

Over the past few months, the International Missions Committee has shared the International Missions projects/trips sponsored by Gold Canyon United Methodist Church with the congregation in this newsletter. This month the committee would like to focus on the international missions projects supported by the church-wide United Methodist Church through the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR). UMCOR's goal is to assist the most vulnerable persons affected by crisis or chronic need without regard to their race, religion, gender, or sexual orientation. UMCOR believes all people have God-given worth and dignity.

Founded in 1940 under the name Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief (MCOR), its original mission was to respond to suffering among peoples overseas after the onset of World War II. Presently, UMCOR's work reaches people in more than 80 countries, including the United States. This organization provides humanitarian relief when war, conflict, or natural disaster disrupt life to such an extent that communities are unable to recover on their own. Survivors of natural disasters in Nicaragua, Haiti, Chile, Pakistan, and Japan, famine in Africa and war torn countries such as Afghanistan, Liberia, Rwanda and Bosnia have all been helped by UMCOR. U.S. communities affected by hurricanes and other disasters also received assistance from UMCOR.

UMCOR is a very reputable charity as evaluated by a number of organizations. The Better Business Bureau's Wise Giving Report states that UMCOR uses 91% of its funds for its programs, 1% for fundraising and 8% for administrative costs. The Charity Navigator gives it a 3 star rating (out of a possible 4 stars) for financial performance and a 4 star rating for accountability and transparency.

UMCOR works closely with other international relief organizations such as Lutheran World Relief, Catholic Relief Services and other Christian-based agencies. As one of the founding organizations of the Foods Resource Bank, a Christian-based group focusing on sustainable food security programs instead of disaster relief, UMCOR has funded projects that have had far-reaching results. One such program was the Mtumba Rural Women's Training Project of the Anglican Church of Tanzania. Over a six year period (2002-2008), this project in 3 villages near Dodoma, Tanzania focused on helping farmers improve their farms, helping them improve their civic participation and helping them save money so that they can support their families during the hungry season.

The results of this project improved the lives of 2,250 households (13,523 individuals) in the 3 villages. Farmers now grow a wider variety of crops that they can use and sell. A savings organization has grown to 423 members who have saved a total of 35.9 million Tanzanian shillings (approximately \$25,000.00). Also in 2006, only 25 children in all 3 villages attended high school or post-secondary organizations. Today, 1,080 children receive this education. The partnering of these organizations has blessed our sisters and brothers in these 3 villages in ways that only God can bring about. The farmers in these villages are now working with farmers in other villages to help them improve the lives of themselves and their families. God's work is spreading!

We invite you to take a closer look at your church-wide relief organization - The United Methodist Committee on Relief. Visit their website at www.umcor.org. Keep them in your prayers. Remember Christ's words that encourage us to help the poor and downtrodden. For when we do, we are helping Christ himself.

Thinking Theologically —

On July 1 after worship, I will be driving to Mingus Mountain Church Camp where I will be the Dean for the Senior High Church Camp. For 5 days, I will be joined by about 40 teenagers and a handful of other adults...yes, it's one of the ways I like to have fun! During the week we will be discovering God's treasures through study of the scriptures, especially the Parables of Jesus. If you haven't studied the parables in a while, you might want to consider reading through a couple of them, then read some commentaries on what "the experts" believe Jesus meant when he taught others about God and God's kingdom using stories.

Stories are a great way to illustrate how God works in our lives. I think that's why Jesus used stories so much during his ministry. Take, for example, the parables of the lost sheep and the lost coin Luke 15:4-10. Both of these stories illustrate the importance of finding something or someone who is lost. By

found in Luke 15:4-10. Both of these stories illustrate the importance of finding something or someone who is lost. By using everyday examples – things that the people in first century Palestine would have understood – Jesus was able to teach them (and us) how precious they are in God's sight. And we can benefit from these lessons as well.

In his online daily devotional called *Our Daily Bread* (found at www.odb.org), Professor of Evangelism Dennis Fisher wrote the following about the Parable of the Lost Coin:

"Recently I couldn't find my credit card. I began frantically looking for it because losing a credit card is no small thing. Automatic payments and daily purchases would all be disrupted until it could be replaced. Not to mention the possibility of someone finding it and charging items to our account. What a relief it was when my wife found it on the floor under the computer table."

Now, I have to admit, I lose things on a regular basis...probably because we have way too much stuff in our house! When I can't find my car keys, or my glasses, or the TV remote control, usually the first thing I ask myself is "where did you have it or them last?" Most of the time that works, and I'm able to find the thing that I've lost...but not always. Sometimes I spend hours (OK...maybe minutes) looking for something I know I had just a few minutes before, and then I get frustrated when I can't find it. But one thing is certain...I never give up until I have found the thing that I've lost. I just can't seem to move on until the lost has been found.

And you know, that's the way it is with God. Jesus' parables of the Lost Sheep and the Lost Coin tell us so. God doesn't give up until the lost has been found. God will leave the rest of the flock to tend for themselves (because God knows that they can) in order to go find the one that has been lost. Or God will search the whole world over, just like the woman searched her home looking for the lost coin. God is relentless that way...God doesn't give up on us.

We should also be relentless when it comes to helping the lost become found. As followers of Jesus Christ, we are commissioned by God to find the lost and bring them back into the fold. This is one of the lessons I hope the teens at church camp will learn during our time up on Mingus Mountain...in between worship, scavenger hunts, hikes, arts & crafts, and games of "Goji" (ask me sometime about that one!!). It's also a lesson I hope you will ponder, in between your morning cups of coffee and whatever else you have on your agenda each day. God loves us all so much...and God will not let the lost remain lost for long. Thanks be to God for giving us Jesus and his parables. Thanks be to God for not giving up on the lost. Amen.
