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From The Pastor: "Easier Than You Think"

Occasionally when I am in a group setting, somebody will ask if someone is willing to pray. And in response to that request sometimes I will hear a person or two mutter quietly, "Not me, I am not

good at prayer." I know many people do not think they are good at prayer. So they don't pray. It's too bad because I think they are missing out on a valuable spiritual discipline.

Sometimes people think that prayer is complicated. Yet prayer is much easier than you think. Prayer doesn't need to be filled with lofty words. It doesn't need to be a certain pattern. Although some structure can help us pray when we find ourselves stuck in a rut and praying the same things over and over. Yet there is no mystical method that we must follow.

If you can talk to a friend, then you can talk to God. We know that Moses argued with God and even balked at doing what God told him to do. Prayer was an open and honest conversation between God and Moses. At times it was negotiation. Other times Moses spoke words of anger and frustration. But it was Moses' connection with God through prayer that saw him through as a leader of the Hebrews.

I once read of a man who simplified his prayer life by putting an empty chair before him and imagining that Jesus was sitting in that chair. He simply spoke to Jesus as a friend. Maybe you need to pull up an empty chair. Maybe you need to set a scheduled time for prayer. My hope this summer is that you will take the time to develop your prayer life. See you on Sunday as we explore various aspects of prayer.




We're Back !!!!

"Ring of Fame Inductee" Congratulations Doug!

This year, Gold Canyon's own **Doug Benton** was among those who were inducted into the prestigious "Ring of Fame"

for Handbell and Handchime musicians. Every two years, the Area 11 Handbell Musicians of America recognizes up to four individuals who have made outstanding contributions to the art of ringing Handbells and Handchimes. The criteria for the award include achievement of national recognition for contributions to Handbell Musicians of America, developing materials or methods specific to handbells or chimes, extended teaching or conducting that raises the musical standards for ringing and composing music for handbells and handchimes.

Mr. Benton began his musical education with piano lessons at age six. In sixth grade, he began playing the baritone. When Doug was in his sophomore year in high school, he was given the opportunity to play the organ at church when the organist was in traction after a car accident. That was the beginning of his illustrious career in church music.

In 1973, Doug was the organist at Mount of Olive Lutheran Church in Phoenix when a friend invited him to a youth handbell concert given by a church in Bartlesville, Oklahoma. After that concert, he accepted an invitation to attend the National Handbell Festival at ASU the following week. When Doug heard England's Thurlestone Ringers, he was hooked! He raised money to purchase a two-octave set of bells for the church and started a group with eight youth. The group, called the MOO Ringers (short for Mount of Olives) rang for the first time at Christmas Eve of that year.

Doug has since developed the Harter Memorial

Handbell Ringers at Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff. He has served as Arizona State Chair of the Handbell Musicians of America and set up clinics and festivals all over the state. As Chair of Area 11, Doug established a state organization in Colorado. He also served as the first Chair of Director Education, with committees focused on a new system of certification, modeled after the American Guild of Organists. He was also instrumental in creating a new event with a track for advanced ringers and groups called Handbell Spectacular. Over the years, Doug has been a frequent contributor to OVERTONES, writing several articles on bell techniques, conducting and rhythm. He became famous as a bass bell expert, and is a published composer and arranger of handbell, choral, organ, brass, and orchestral music.

Doug Benton is currently the Director of Music Ministries at Gold Canyon United Methodist Church, where he directs two handbell choirs, two vocal choirs, and an orchestra. He produces a Performing Arts Series, plays the organ for worship services and concerts, and oversees music for the Praise and Country Western Services. Doug says, "I am truly blessed to be here at this place at this time doing what I am doing! Life is very good, indeed!"

Also inducted into the 2012 "Ring of Fame" were Jennie and Roy Blomquist of Scottsdale, Arizona.

The luncheon in the beautiful Grand Salon was delicious. A friend of mine from Grace United Methodist in Mesa attended because Doug gave her lessons. You ole time choir members may remember that Pat White came to our church and played a solo on the bells when Mary Ann wanted to start them at GCUMC. I sat next to one of Doug's special friends Monica, from Colorado, who mentioned she had friends that attended that church—Ed and Elaine Brunkhorst. Of course I know them as they live at Sunland Springs Village. They attend second service and sit in the first row of the east balcony.

The Gold Canyon United Methodist Church has a Permanent Endowment Fund which was established several years ago. Did you know that it is possible to make a difference in the ministry of GCUMC even after you are gone? SCRIP/BUS FUND ~

Did you know?????..... Over the past ten years, at no cost to participants, the church bus fund has earned over \$104,000 from the Scrip program (\$86,000 from Bashas', \$18,000 from Fry's). This is fantastic!! This money was used to purchase our bus and pay for gas, insurance and maintenance. No w that we need to purchase a fifteen passenger van to accompany our bus we are asking all of you who shop at these two stores to consider using a Bashas' Community Support card and/or Fry's Gift card purchased at the church Information Center on Sunday mornings or at the church office during the week. Each card starts with \$20, \$50 or \$100, and you recharge it as often as necessary just before you check out at the store (or at Customer Service), using your personal charge card, a check or cash; then use the card to pay for your purchases, and you can even use it for gas at Fry's! Bashas' gives the church 6% of every dollar you load onto the card, Fry's 3%. Bashas' cards are honored at Bashas' grocery stores, A.J.'s Fine Foods and Food City. Fry's cards are accepted at Fry's grocery stores, Fry's Marketplace, and all other Kroger-owned stores throughout the US. Many of you in the past only used the "number program" at Bashas' which was a separate program - this program was discontinued about two years ago due to economic conditions. This month we share a letter received in early July from Lisa Armstrong, founding missionary of Fellow Man International of Honduras. May your hearts and prayers guide you as you read her letter.

My Dear Friends,

I thank you for your continued support of Fellow Man International Mission. The purpose of this letter is two-fold: to inform you of recent events in Honduras that have impacted the Mission and me; and, to ask for your financial assistance at this critical time. Your support of the poor people of Honduras has made possible the miracle of the Mission and its outreach. With your support it can continue.

The Situation in Honduras. Honduras is now considered only second to Afghanistan as the most violent country in the world. The rate of murder per capita, gang violence and drug trafficking are wreaking havoc in the country. And now, drug trafficking and murder have come to threaten even the small corner of Honduras where the Mission is located.

Recently, my life and that of my children was threatened by local Honduran drug traffickers. These criminals, some of whom come from the village where I have lived, I know have ties with South American drug cartels. They are using the road which passes the clinic, and then goes on the unpatrolled border between Honduras and Guatemala. It is considered a safe passageway to transport illicit drugs, arms and currency among other things.

Without detailing the issues, I wish you to know that I have been forced to return to the United States with my children and nanny for the time being. With the knowledge I have of the involvement of local people with the cartel, the conditions have so deteriorated that my presence endangers the staff and employees.

I am living in Chanute (Kansas) at this time, working as a temporary nurse in the local hospital as well as Wesley Medical Center in Wichita. I am managing a work schedule while continuing



daily direct Mission activities by using the Internet and cell phone. While my physical address has changed, my sense of God's call to serve the Honduran people through the Mission has not. God's plan for my life and His plan for the mission remain the primary focus of my energy and passion.

The work of the mission continues in full force, managed by two employees in professional leader-ship positions. Teresa Bu is the interim administrator. (She served as the mission's attorney for years and requested to become an employee, knowing that the FMI project is too valuable for her people to lose.) Dr. Marvin Pineda continues as the Medical Director, guiding clinical activities. Having been with the Mission for more than three years and embracing its vision of service, he can satisfactorily fulfill his role.

It has been more than twelve years since the clinic opened. Most of the employees have been at the clinic from the beginning and are fully vested in its vision. It has always been my desire that Hondurans work for the benefit of their own people. They are now thrust into a position with no alternative and I feel a heavy responsibility to advocate for them so the work of the Mission may continue.

GREAT FINANCIAL NEED. I am deeply concerned about the Missions' financial situation at this time. There are only enough funds to keep the clinic doors open through the end of June. In order to provide for the needs of the sick, the hungry and those who are desperate for an education, it will be necessary to raise an additional \$87,000

from July through December 31, 2012. The salaries of fourteen workers compose more than \$65,000 of the total needed. These workers include: one physician, three nurses, an administrator, two agricultural workers, a trade store manager, watchmen, a clinic housekeeper and driver. The remaining \$22,000 will be used to purchase medications, medical supplies, and fuel for the generator and mission vehicles as well as feed the live animals and supplies for the agriculture project. This translates into services for more than six thousand people who visit the mission in the next six and a half months, many of whom are women and children.

I ask you to consider providing financial assistance to Fellow Man International of Honduras which will be translated into an expression of God's love: hope, medical care, dental care and economic opportunities for the Honduran people. They have nowhere else to turn.

Thank you in advance for taking my request into consideration. Through prayer and contemplation, I hope you can respond with financial gifts. God uses that small still voice that speaks to all of us when we are in communion with God to support the work of love.

If you have already contributed, thank you so very much! Perhaps you can consider another gift. Your gifts have already made a different in the lives of so many. Your continued gifts will continue to make that difference.



Thinking Theologically —

Well folks...those of you who don't live in Arizona during the summer probably don't know this, but we are well into the throws of the Arizona Monsoon Season!! Not long ago (on July 14, 2012) a storm hit the state that created power outages for about 6,000 homes in the East Valley, caused a flash flood in Lake Havasu City, and temporarily grounded all flights in and out of Sky Harbor Airport for a short period of time. Even Highway 60 was closed at Val Vista Avenue in Gilbert because every lane of traffic was underwater! Even one of my Facebook friends commented on how powerful the storm was, claiming that a microburst had hit her neighborhood, taking out trees, downing power lines, and making the park into a swim-

ming hole! The Monsoon storms here in Arizona are often sudden and destructive...but the good news is they usually don't last very long, which for those of us living here year-round is a blessing.


Storms are a great metaphor for life. They can be predictable or unpredictable, gentle or destructive, calming or scary...face it: storms make our lives interesting. And when we look to the Bible, probably the most notable of the "storm" stories is the one found in Mark 4:35-41 where Jesus calms the storm while he and the disciples are in the boat on their way across the sea. Jesus has just finished teaching the crowds. He's tired and needs some rest. So he says to the disciples "let's get out of here and go to the other side of the sea." So they all hop into a boat and set sail for the other side. Jesus immediately falls asleep while the rest of the disciples do...well, whatever it is that disciples do in a boat! Then, quite unexpectedly, a storm comes up and the disciples are terrified. They wake Jesus up...whining and complaining about the wind and the waves...questioning Jesus, and accusing him of not caring whether they live or die. And what does Jesus do? He calms the wind and the waves. And the disciples? They are left wondering who this man is, that even the wind and the waves listen to him.

How do we react when faced with a storm? Do we whine and complain about the wind and the rain? Or do we rejoice in the fact that through the wind God has given us cleaner air, and because of the rain all that grows on the earth is renewed? When the power goes out, do we stress out because our TVs and computers don't work? Or do we enjoy the simplicity of being "unplugged" for a short time? Yes, storms can be an inconvenience, but they can also be a blessing.

We teased her about using a cookie sheet. The platform was very crowded. One Sunday I was seated directly behind the pastor and could look over his shoulder at his notes as he preached.

Mary Ann promoted many social activities with the choir to develop friendships and establish rapport. Everyone knew everyone else and we had a good time.

I went to work part-time in the church office. I will tell you more about those early experiences in the next column.

You have all been so sweet and kind to June and me whenever we have been able to come to a morning worship service. I feel like I owe you an apology for not seeing you more often. Unfortunately, the damage done inside her brain is too severe and it is not able to improve or halt the decline.

Many times, I plan for us to be at the 9:30 AM service only to be up most of the night with her, or be unable to get her ready and alert enough to come in the morning.

I am in the process of getting her into an excellent day care program two days a week. If all goes well, she should be there very soon.

You may see her/us infrequently on Sunday mornings until I can arrange for a skilled caregiver to be with her while I come. She will be with me whenever we do a 5 PM service.

Thank you for your love, concern and prayers. We do appreciate all of you more than any words can say.

STEPHEN MINISTRY

What does the name "Stephen Ministry" really mean? We write about it every month. We encourage you to speak with one if you need. We tell you that Stephen Ministers listen, encourage, care and never judge – all very true! But where did the name come from, and why? I never knew, until I decided to enter the training to become a Stephen Minister. And, I found it very inspiring. As I considered whether or not others would be interested, I tested out the question. When asked where the name came from, my husband replied "From Stephen of course." I begrudgingly had to concede to his accuracy, but if you would like the rest of the story, read on!

The name *Stephen* comes from St. Stephen, who was the first layperson commissioned by the Apostles to provide caring ministry to those in need. (Acts 6) Some of the traits Stephen, and others chosen for caring ministry, had included integrity, wisdom, and sensitivity to God. He had a real understanding of God that led him to practical and compassionate actions toward others. Each person has a vital part to play in the life of the church, and Stephen certainly found his calling. Thus, in 1975 he became the namesake for this important Christian caring ministry.

How do you determine whether you might like to meet with a Stephen Minister? As written in Galatians (scripture below), we all have *loads* and we all have *burdens*. Distinguishing between the two can sometimes be difficult. Ponder this – *loads* are the normal daily weight that every person carries; *burdens* are those exceedingly heavy and troublesome weights that arise.

Annual Conference: Second Opportunity

I was unable to attend the nominating committee meeting this year but soon learned I had been

nominated as a delegate to attend the 28th annual session of the Desert Southwest Conference. I was pleased to be asked to attend.

It was far less confusing this year as I had a better understanding of process and procedure as well as what was expected of the attendees. As last year, the days were a bit long and I tired of sitting so much but what I learned was interesting and enlightening. The body of the conference was made up of 232 clergy, 265 lay delegates, 40 alternates and 147 guests. The sessions held to a very strict protocol which was enforced by the Bishop and Conference Secretary. Attendees appeared interested and engaged in the proceedings.

Although the resolutions before the conference were fewer in volume and less contentious than last year, great disappointment with accomplishments (or the lack thereof) during General Conference was evident. Resolutions passed at annual conferences over the last four years, offering modifications to the Book of Discipline to make the language contained therein more inclusive, were summarily voted down. In fact, there were no changes to the Book of Discipline in that regard. We profess to be a church of Open Doors, Open Hearts and Open

Minds but this action, or inaction, belies a different attitude.

The day of learning was informative and provided food for thought and possible action on how the church could be more effective in providing for the "common good". The needs of our various communities are great and we can surely take action to assess and react to those needs.

The charitable focus of this conference was "Imagine No Malaria". We viewed several video clips documenting the efforts to educate, provide sleep nets and medication. Offerings during worship were designated for this cause.

Each of the worship services was moving and inspirational allowing me to reflect on exactly what we were to do during this gathering. The closing worship service was especially moving with the theme of living water which had been carried throughout the conference. The staging with fabric that actually looked like running water was very effective. At the end of the children's message with Bishop Carcaño the children pulled water colored fabric down the length of the meeting hall portraying a river of living water flowing out of the temple as visioned by the prophet Ezekiel (47: 1-12). In closing, we reaffirmed our baptism as part of this lovely and meaningful service.

I very much appreciate the opportunity to represent our church at these proceedings. The next conference annual session is scheduled for June 27 - 30, 2013 at the same conference center in Glendale.
