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From The Pastor: "A Thankful Spirit"

November is the month when we remember to be thankful. It is so easy to take everything we have in life for granted. And it doesn't take much for us to begin to grumble about the prob-

lems in our lives. But in those moments when I am ready to complain I talk to or read about people who face extremely difficult circumstances with courage.

In the fall of 2000, Pastor Ed Dobson was diagnosed with ALS (or Lou Gehrig's disease), a degenerative disease with no known cause or cure. In 2012 Pastor Dobson wrote about his feelings in his book, Seeing Through the Fog.

There are many things for which I am not grateful. I can no longer button the buttons on my shirt. I can no longer put on a heavy jacket. I can no longer raise my right hand above my head. I can no longer write. I can no longer eat with my right hand. I eat with my left hand, and now even that is becoming a challenge. And over time all of these challenges will get worse and worse. So what in the world do I have to be grateful for?

So much.

Lord, thank you for waking me up this morning. Lord, thank you that I can turn over in my bed. Lord, thank you that I can still get out of bed. Lord, thank you that I can walk to the bathroom...Lord, thank you that I can still brush my teeth...Lord, thank you that I can still eat breakfast. Lord, thank you that I can still dress myself. Lord, thank you that I can still drive my car. Lord, thank you that I can still walk. Lord, thank you that I can still walk.

And the list goes on and on. I have learned in my journey with ALS to focus on what I can do, not on what I can't do. I have learned to be grateful for the small things in my life and for the many things I can still do.

I am reminded through Pastor Dobson's words that we always need to focus on what we can do. If Pastor Dobson can give thanks, then I think we all can find something to be thankful for. The Apostle Paul wrote in 1 Thessalonians 5:18, "give thanks in all circumstances." It takes spiritual discipline to do so when difficulties come our way. But if we are able to find things to give thanks for, then that thankful spirit lifts us up.

May we learn to give thanks for those things that bless our life. I pray you may have a Happy Thanksgiving and I will see you on Sunday.

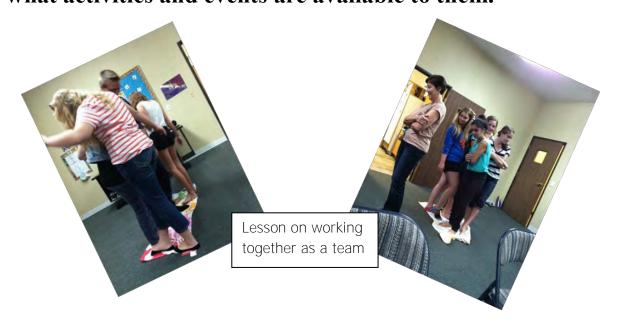

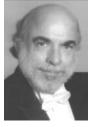

News from the Health and Wellness Ministry of Susan Malloy, Parish Nurse





It is hard to believe that we are truly in the "Fall season". We have been blessed with some lovely weather and I hope you all are enjoying it. Recently, I was reminded that perhaps I need to educate you about the other type of "Fall" as in "to leave a erect position suddenly and involuntarily" (according to Webster's definition of the word 'fall' in this context). In recent months I have had interactions with several folks who have experienced a "fall" that resulted in pain and suffering. According to the CDC (Center of Disease Control) over 2.3 million non-fatal falls occurred in 2010, and of those treated in the emergency room, 662,000 were hospitalized. The cost of the direct medical care was \$30 billion dollars. 1 out of 3 "fall" victims were over the age of 65 and those over age 75 had the most falls. I hope this valuable information can help you PREVENT such an event and subsequent suffering.

As we age, physical changes, health challenges, and sometimes the medications used to manage those challenges can make falls more likely. Another thing that happens as we age is the belief that "it will never happen to me". As the old adage goes "Never say Never". Therefore, we must be diligent to assess our own situations and be proactive, especially in our homes.

Questions to Think About

- Have you ever fallen, or had a close call?
- Do you take antidepressants or sedatives?
- Do you have eye/vision health challenges like cataracts, glaucoma, macular degeneration, partial blindness, or are you overdue for new glasses?
- Has a stroke affected your ability to see?
- Do you have mobility issues related to arthritis or foot problems?
- Do you have heart problems (rhythm irregularities, orthostatic hypotension, etc)?
- Has a Doctor limited your physical activity?

Proactive Steps to Take

- Keep moving—This is important to maintain strength; consider walking outside (avoid rough terrain), or on a track (AJ Multi-Gen Center, or similar)
- Ask your Doctor for a referral to a physical therapist who can create a custom exercise program aimed at improving your balance, flexibility, muscle strength and gait.

• Consider your footwear—It may be time for a new size in shoes as foot size can change as we age. For women, it's time to get rid of the high heels and find an attractive shoe with good support and non-skid soles. For men, avoid extra thick or slick soles, and slip-ons that are floppy and lack support. Choose lace up shoes, keep the laces tied securely. If you have difficulty with laces, go with shoes that have Velcro fabric tabs.

- Surroundings in Your Home:

- ♦ Keep all cords away from walkways
- ♦ Remove or secure loose or very fluffy rugs (double -sided tape, tacks, slip-resistant backing)
- ♦ Move coffee tables, magazine racks and plant stands from high traffic areas
- ♦ Use non-slip mats in your shower or bathtub
- Use hand rails for both sides of stair cases and grab bars for shower or tub
- ♦ If you have difficulty in the shower/tub, purchase a sturdy plastic seat like an outdoor patio chair for the shower, & a handheld shower nozzle to use while seated.
- ♦ Consider a raised toilet seat or one with arm rests to help steady you as you rise;
- ♦ Keep your home well lit to prevent tripping over objects that are hard to see (outside and inside)
- Place night lights in the darkest areas of the house (bedroom, bathroom or hallways)
- ♦ You can now purchase GE Motion activated LED "night lights" from Wal-mart for about \$9.99 walk into the area and the light will go on, giving light until you can reach the main light switch
- Keep flashlights & batteries in easy to reach places

Please **be proactive by utilizing these suggestions** to keep yourself safe and free of harm. A fall can do both physical and emotional damage, by causing diminished self confidence and loss of independence. The deficits caused by such an injury, have a ripple effect; your loved ones will also be affected by the harm that occurs to you.

Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT)

Save time, simplify your life, and support our church! In this new millennium the church is

keeping up with the times by offering our givers an easier way to support our ministries. Our electronic contribution program is an automatic funds transfer program that will allow you to make contributions without having to lift a pen to write a check or reach into your wallet for cash!

Here is how it works: you authorize a specified amount of money to be electronically transferred directly from your checking or savings account to the church's account. You can also specify the frequency of the transfer to allow you to keep your check register up to date.

It is fast, safe, and easy! In fact, it is less risky than checks, as it cannot be lost, stolen, or destroyed in the mail, and the rate of accuracy is high. The electronic transfer will cost you NOTH-ING and you save the cost of the check. The church will issue you a donation statement for your records, and bank statements will provide you with a record of transfer as additional proof of vour contributions. Donations via electronic transfer can be made to our general fund and/or our building fund. Designations to Missions or the Pastors Discretionary Fund can also be made. Of course you can cancel your authorization of transfer at any time by notifying us in writing. 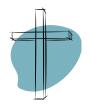

Pastoral & Congregational Care



As the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays approach, many of us feel our blood pressures start to rise as our stress levels start to increase. It's so easy to get caught up in the hustle and bustle of the holiday season...but for many of us who are dealing with grief, sadness, sickness, or other personal and professional difficulties, the holidays are yet another time when we can melt down if we're not careful.

According to a website called "Surviving the Holidays," the months of October, November, and December can be excruciatingly painful for those who are dealing with loss or other traumatic circumstances in their lives. Whether you are dealing with grief, trauma, or stress, here are a few tips from the website on how we can not only survive the holidays, but maybe even enjoy them.

- PREPARE The ambush of emotions can attack at any time; prepare yourself and expect them to occur.
- ACCEPT the difficulty of this time of year. Remind yourself that it's only a season and it will pass.
- SOCIALIZE Don't hibernate. You may be tempted by your feelings to isolate yourself, but force yourself to go out even if it's only for a short time.
- LOWER your expectations Movies and songs paint an unrealistic picture of the holidays. You don't have to be everything to everyone...and you don't have to do everything yourself.
- DON'T ANESTHETIZE the pain with drugs or alcohol – Numbing emotional distress with chemicals creates more depression.
- TRIMMING If old ornaments or decorations cause too much pain, don't put them out this year. Set them aside for another time.
- GET UP AND MOVE Take care of your physical well-being. Healthy foods will give you strength; fattening and sugar-filled foods can worsen your depression. Exercise produces natural stress reducers.
- SHOP online if going to the mall is too stressful.
- HAVE A COPING STRATEGY Have the phone number of a counselor, pastor, church, close friend or hotline already taped to your phone. Make the commitment to call someone if negative thoughts get fierce.

- LIGHT Get some sunshine. Winter can take its toll on your emotions by the loss of sun you experience.
- INVITE a new (same-sex) friend to see a movie, have dinner or help decorate the house.
- SET BOUNDARIES Explain to your family and friends as clearly as you can what you are capable of doing this year, and what you aren't. Don't let others guilt you into taking on more than you can handle.
- REACH OTHERS by discovering people who might be alone during the holidays.

There are many individuals and groups available through the church that can help you get through the holiday season this year and every year. We encourage you to reach out to us and let us help.

CONGREGATION CARE MINISTRY (CCM) UPCOMING TRAINING!

To reach the intangible needs in our community and within the GCUMC congregation more effectively, we need many individuals who are equipped for one-on-one interaction. Ideally, every Christian should be in a position to respond to others in a heartfelt, helpful way. Do you sense that this is an opportunity that God would have you pursue? Would you like to feel comfortable reaching out to persons who are ill, homebound, or grieving? CCM training may be just what you need.

Congregational Care Ministry training occurs in three sessions conducted by Rev. Fay Quanstrom. On **November 14** two sessions will be offered, one **from 9-12 and repeated from 1-4**. Topics include a survey of opportunities for service, discussion of personal growth opportunities in preparation for this ministry, praying aloud, focused listening, making good visits, preparing for awkward situations, legal considerations, questions on evil in the world, serving Communion to the homebound, and anointing with prayer for healing.

You may attend the morning workshop or the afternoon if you would like to be part of the ongoing opportunities to reach out in Christian love, either informally or as a trained CCM (Congregational Care Minister). All are welcome!

Global Missions

Global Missions!

Bill Gates, who may be the wealthiest philanthropist in the world, and to whom Warren Buffett has entrusted his philanthropic distributions, has remarked that giving away money in a way that makes a positive difference is far more difficult than he ever imagined. Really?

Can helping others fail to help? Might help actually do harm? Missiologists—those who study mission and relief work--state that Haiti has been ruined by 100 years of relief. How can this be? Generous and well-meaning people have only tried to help! Much of this giving has been done by Christians who "saw a brother in need." Billions of dollars of relief money has poured into Haiti over the last century. That amount of expenditure of cash and effort has, sadly, not changed the lives of the average Haitian for the better.

Even Global Missions efforts can slide into charity that leaves the giver feeling good but robs the recipient of dignity, motivation, and work. Global Mission projects, then, should contribute to the dignity of the recipient, motivate self-help, provide opportunity to work, and respect local resources. The project needs to be needed.

How does the Global Missions Committee's selling of coffee, tea, and chocolate look against this standard? A person might ask if enough money is raised to make this effort worthwhile, or are there other significant considerations? Green

Parrot coffee is grown by small farmers in the mountains of Honduras. Missionary Lisa Armstrong established medical and agricultural outreach in this community after assessing local needs. Lisa's vision includes teaching people how to nourish themselves to reduce the common problem of hunger and malnutrition. After first establishing a medical clinic to address some of the most common physical conditions and injuries, Lisa set up an agriculture project raising corn and other grains, and dairy cows. The result has been the ability of the mission to meet some of the food needs of the community while at the same time generating employment for individuals and income for the mission. Setting up a coffee co-op has helped small growers pool their product and sell it at fair market prices, increasing the growers' selfsufficiency and human dignity. It is sustainable.

It's "teaching people to fish" rather than simply giving them a fish, and it is done in Christ's name and for his sake. Take a look at the coffee, tea, and chocolate that's available at the Global Missions booth! Please patronize this difference-making and sustainable mission project!

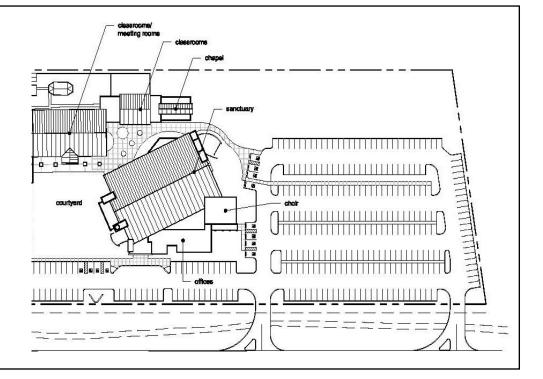

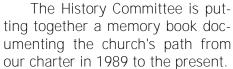

A Note From Bob... Country Western News

Every now and then I get reminded that an idea that is

tossed around as a great theory is in fact (1) Rock solid reality and (2) Not all that easy to live out.

Recently I was on a radio program with Dr. Pierre Tariot, Director of Banner Alzheimer's Institute and Leeza Gibbons, a television talk show hostess and celebrity. The program was hosted by Maryann Makekau, the woman with whom I co-authored the children's book, "When Your Grandma Forgets."

In the course of the conversation between us, Leeza Gibbons, whose mother died from Alzheimer's disease, said, "I found as I struggled with being her caregiver that it served no useful purpose to focus my thoughts on the past and all the things we could no longer do together. Neither was it helpful to think too much about the dismal prospects of the future. The only thing that worked was to literally 'live in the moment' and enjoy every small conversation, moment of communication or a time when she was calm and seemed content."

As one who has worked in the field of loss and grief for 35 years, I knew that the only chance people had to enjoy each other or to find any kind of internal peace when their loved one was gone, was in a given moment. But, I knew it only as a theory.

As I have struggled to adjust to no longer having June at home, seeing her lose every skill she had, be unable to perform the most basic functions of life and seeing this once talented dancer unable to stand up—I forgot that living in the moment is much more than a good theory.

I am now practicing this idea with all the focus I can muster. I allow myself to enjoy a few minutes of balloon toss with her, seeing an occasional smile, a few peaceful minutes before she falls asleep and I go home alone. It is working.

I think my own survival is being enhanced by practicing living in the moment.

When you get faced with some stressful situation, try it.

We all helped out however we could, which included taking turns manning the nursery and teaching Sunday School. I can remember alternating Sundays with Cheryl Hall to teach the 1st -3rd graders in those early years. Because there was no place to store our materials, we simply put everything in a big tote bag and passed that back

and forth each week. Teaching Sunday School and supervising the nursery were not the only jobs that needed to be done. If a person could carry a tune, he/she was also encouraged to sing in the choir led by Beth O'Hara. We were lucky if we had a dozen of us singing on any give Sunday but we made our "joyful noise" just the same. In those first few years we all got to know each other pretty well. Martha **Burkinshaw was the "cookie lady". Nearly every Sun**day she would man the table, pass out goodies and drinks and make sure that everyone, especially the children felt welcomed. Loren Betz led us all in congregational singing before the service even started. Dr. Barry Sutter, retired superintendent of Apache Junction Schools, taught the adult Sunday School Class for awhile. We all helped set up and take down chairs. There are so many others who wore so many hats to help us grow in size and spirit during those first years. With the help of the Lord, grow we did.!

I never would have believed that 25 years later our little church would have grown into the one we know now but as Gold Canyon grew, so did the church. God knew the importance of location, location, location.

It is November, and at this time of Thanksgiving it seems only fitting to share

a wonderful story about one of the greatest gifts we can all have—other people, to accompany us on this **journey we call "life."** The author is unknown, but gives us a powerful message:

Two Horses



Just up the road from a farmer's home is a field, with two horses in it. From a distance, each horse looks like any other horse. But if you stop your car, or are walking by, you will notice something quite amazing. Looking into the eyes of one horse will disclose that he is blind. His owner has chosen not to have him put down, but has made a good home for him. This alone is amazing.

If you stand nearby and listen, you will hear the sound of a bell. Looking around for the source of the sound, you will see that it comes from the smaller horse in the field. Attached to the horse's halter is a small bell. It lets the blind friend know where the other horse is, so he can follow.

As you stand and watch these two friends, you'll see that the horse with the bell is always checking on the blind horse, and that the blind horse will listen for the bell and then slowly walk to where the other horse is, trusting that he will not be led astray. When the horse with the bell returns to the shelter of the barn each evening, it stops occasionally and looks back, making sure that the blind friend isn't too far behind to hear the bell.

Like the owners of these two horses, God does not throw us away just because we are not perfect or because we have problems or challenges. He watches over us and even brings others into our lives to help us when we are in need.

Sometimes we are the blind horse being guided by the little ringing bell of those who God places in our lives. Other times we are the guide horse, helping others to find their way. Good friends are like that. You may not always see them, but you know they are always there...Please listen for my bell and I'll listen for yours, and remember...Be kinder than necessary—everyone you meet is fighting some kind of battle.

Live simply, Love generously, Care deeply, Speak kindly......

FOR WE WALK BY FAITH, NOT BY SIGHT!

This month, make it a point to note those around you—those who've been there when you needed them, those who appear to be struggling at the moment, and those you may not have noticed before. Take the extra step to be a friend, to see the friend in those around you, and to seek out a friend if you find yourself in need of strength, encouragement and hope.

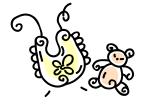

Stitches Unlimited or Quilts for St Andrews Clinic



On Thursday, October 3rd, the guilts and afghans we had made went to St. Andrews clinic. We know that the kids and families appreciated every one.

Our group makes and donates quilts to the **St Andrews Clinic.** The quilts we make range from infant size (about 40" x 40") to quilts for older kids (about 42" x 60"). Donations of quilts of any size are accepted. We would also accept crocheted afghans. We are also making doll quilts (about 24" x 24") for the children at Christmas.

We have been at work all summer. We have quilt top kits already cut for simple ABC style quilts, directions included. If you sew come pick up a kit and sew a guilt top for us, return it and we will do the rest, putting batting and backing with it. Kits are located in the library room behind the kitchen. We sew toiletry bags for St. Andrews as well. Those kits and instructions are also available.

Come join us on the **last Tuesday** of every month. We work year round. Bring your sewing machine and sew (we do have a couple of machines here), your rotary cutter and cut kits, fron, or pick up some kits to sew at home.

We would also gladly take donations of cotton, flannel, light weight denim, light weight corduroy, seersucker, and fleece, in solids, tone on tone, and kid friendly prints. Any size pieces are great. Slightly used sheets (or new) are good for backing too.
