We will have the opportunity to boat on the Sea of Galilee, wade in the Jordan River, worship in Bethlehem, walk where Jesus walked, and visit the empty tomb. We will come back enriched and inspired.

I have talked to some travelers, and the excitement is building. Finally, after several delays due to COVID, the time has arrived. If you are not going with us, please pray for a revitalizing spiritual time for those who are going. We will return with stories, pictures, videos, and stronger faith.

I still remember my trip to Holy Land, which I took thirty years ago. It will be interesting to see what has changed. I remember walking into the tomb at the Church of the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem and being handed a thin candle by a priest to light. After I lit the candle, I placed it in the sand where Jesus' body had laid. It was a profoundly moving experience.

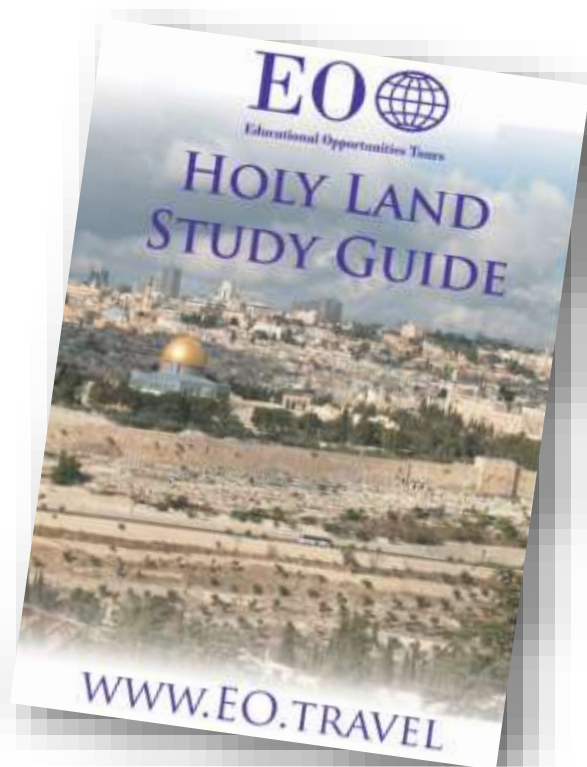

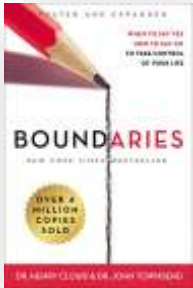

HOPE IS A BALANCING ACT



You may have heard the phrase “hope is not a strategy” used by military, or other leaders, in a variety of contexts. The logic behind this thought process is typically that success does not just happen. To the contrary, to succeed in tactical, business, personal budgeting, or any other goal-based operation in life we must develop a plan or

approach that walks us toward that goal.

What then, is faith in Christ, other than using hope as a strategy? Is it believing in God’s promises to us and relying solely on those promises to take care of everything in our lives, without any input from us?

I’d propose that the actual approach is somewhere in the middle - curling up in a ball in a corner and hoping that everything in our lives will work out exactly as we want vs. taking complete and aggressive control of every moment and orchestrating every step in every day of our lives.

I have come to really enjoy the devotional New Morning Mercies, by Paul David Tripp. In one of his daily messages, he asks “Do you want the Prozac Jesus... who will make us feel better and make our lives easier, for which we would give Him thanks and name Him as faithful?” If you’re not familiar, Prozac is an antidepressant medication, mainly used to treat major depression, obsessive-compulsive disorder, and panic disorder. It has its place with proper diagnosis and administration by a doctor. But how does that fit in with faith and hope in our lives? As we mentioned last month, sometimes we want just enough Jesus to get into heaven, but not enough Jesus to make us uncomfortable!

Tripp defines biblical hope as “a confident expectation of a guaranteed result that changes the way you live.” It is confident because it is based on God’s awesome power, not our own; our expectation of a guaranteed

result allows us to have hope that does not rest on our own understanding but on God’s goodness; and it changes the way we live, giving us confidence and courage to make faith choices that would seem foolish to someone who does not have our hope.

When we combine our hope with the gifts that God gave us (Part 1 of the balancing act), we can do amazing things. We can introduce some of our human effort into daily decisions, steps forward, endeavors, goals, plans, missions. All the while recognizing that we aren’t intended to understand everything that is happening, we can’t predict what is waiting for us around the corner, or the end result and how it looks. Thus, hope is a balancing act of inserting some of our efforts by way of the gifts God has given us, while fully relying on God for, and accepting, the results of our hope even when they don’t come in the form we asked or hoped for.

Part 2 of the balancing act is how we use our gifts and God’s gift of hope in our lives to instill hope in others. I attended the funeral of an amazing woman this month. She had the gift of being high even in her low times and giving her gift of love and hope to others, consistently shining her light. This is what we are called to do. But reality is sometimes our low is very low, and we need help to gain strength for ourselves before we can shine the light for others.

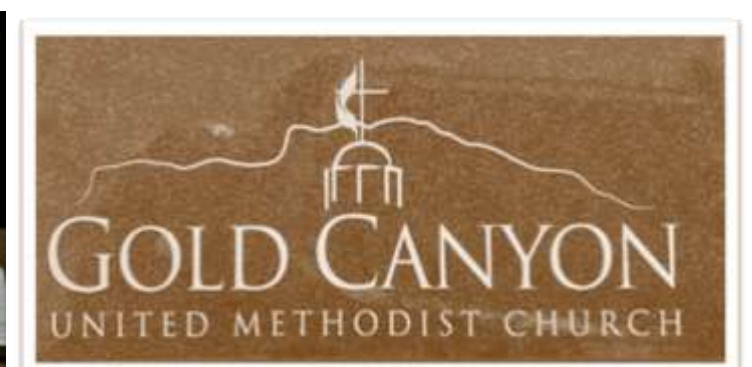

KING OF INSTRUMENTS

Part 5: Church Ministry

We appreciate our congregation's growing interest in the organ project and welcome the questions and comments that people are sharing with the Organ Committee and church staff. Even hard questions and comments are a blessing to receive! Your input strengthens our due diligence and gives us an opportunity to share information in turn. And, to this end, we're taking a pause this month in providing technical information, because we'd like to discuss an important comment that we received a few weeks ago:

COMMENT

I love organ music, and I would be fine if someone specifically donated money to acquire a pipe organ, but I think church funds should instead support outreach ministries.

This thought-provoking comment gave the Organ Committee pause. Had we lost sight of the mission of this church? Were we wrong in believing that a suitable organ was an essential piece of equipment for our church?

Let us begin by defining some terms, including “outreach ministries,” which some describe as “ministries of compassion, justice, and advocacy,” and others speak of “the practice of looking beyond yourself to the people around you and sharing the love of Christ as you serve and connect with your community.” And we might borrow the term “nurture ministry” to describe our other internal activities, which are “focused on education, worship, Christian formation, membership care, small groups, stewardship, and fellowship.”

After careful thought and discussion, the Organ Committee continues to believe that an organ project is in harmony with the goals of our ministries, and we believe that this project enriches the ability of our church to realize its mission. To be clear, we also share the value that outreach ministries are very important. We also perceive a significant outreach component in the organ project, and we strongly believe that a proper balance must be achieved when allocating resources between nurture and outreach ministries. These issues necessarily involve personal value judgments, and each congregant will need to evaluate their own priorities, but here are our thoughts:

Balance between Nurture & Outreach Ministries:

We believe that our outreach ministries are dependent on the blessing of healthy and vibrant nurture ministries within our church community, since nurture ministries mobilize the resources for all of our ministries and are, therefore, no less worthy to receive adequate funding for church staff, facilities, and equipment.

As we know, Jesus sometimes used hyperbole (*exaggerated claims or statements not meant to be taken literally*) to teach his messages. In the same vein on the question of balancing nurture and outreach ministries, we might speculate about the health of a well-meaning church that disproportionately prioritized outreach ministries by eliminating arguable luxuries like air-conditioning, its music program, current staffing levels, or even in-person worship. And if that church redirected its resources in that manner, would it still retain the membership and resources to support its outreach ministries, or would the church and its ministries be diminished?

Obviously, no person has suggested draconian cuts like those described above, but we seek to illustrate our simple belief that healthy and effective ministries require a balance in the allocation of resources to nurture ministries and outreach, much like an ecosystem where both ministries are likely strongest, when both are

adequately funded and prioritized.

Organ Project is both a Nurture & Outreach Ministry:

We believe that the organ project is a nurture ministry, but we also believe it is an outreach ministry, since it will reach into our community and draw people toward the church.

The Organ Committee expects a magnificent instrument to draw events to our sanctuary and welcome people to our church, just as we believe it will draw people to worship, creating a new reason for existing members to attend in-person worship, while enticing and welcoming people who seek a new church home. Admittedly, we can't quantify the outreach effect, just as it's difficult to predict the impact of most outreach ministries, but it is grounded in the experience of other churches who have taken this step.

As you consider whether the organ project is an outreach ministry, we invite you to look inward and ask yourself a simple question: do you want a pipe organ for your own love or appreciation of such music, or do you believe it will be a useful resource to serve our community and draw people to Christian faith and worship? When the Organ Committee examined this question, we affirmed our belief that music ministry plays a significant role in worship and grace, and we believe a quality music program draws people to church.

Pipe Organ is Economically Sound, but Acquisition Cost is Upfront:

We remind the reader of our earlier articles in this series, where the Organ Committee explored the initial cost of a pipe organ versus a replacement digital instrument, and we analyzed the economics of acquiring a pipe organ that will last and enrich many generations, as compared to a digital instrument that places a burden on every generation, when a replacement is required again and again in the decades to come. Admittedly, there are various acquisition options with a pipe organ, and the selection will impact cost; but when one

considers any impact of organ selection on funding for outreach ministries, it distorts the analysis to compare just the initial cost of a pipe organ to the cost of one replacement digital instrument, since the financial impact of a pipe organ is mostly incurred at the time of installation, while replacing a digital organ every eighteen to twenty-five years will perpetually burden church finances in the future.

Pipe Organ Endows Future Generations in Challenging Times:

The Organ Committee recognizes that these are challenging times for our church and our community. The Pandemic continues to impact in-person worship throughout the nation, including for us, although we are blessed with strong online participation. How this phenomenon plays out is unknown: will this be temporary or does a longer road lay before us, rebuilding in-person attendance through new membership? As a further challenge, we know there is a cyclical decline of attendance at mainstream churches, which our church has largely avoided, but it's difficult to predict this demographic impact on our church during the remainder of the 21st century and beyond. And for these reasons, it is a fair question whether this is the time for an organ project.

To be clear, the Organ Committee supports prudent stewardship, but we also remember that GCUMC has a history of acting boldly. Let us not forget that we built our first building (which now serves as our Education Building) when the experts opined that our congregation and community could not support a church. Our first building was dedicated in 1997, which we quickly outgrew, and our current sanctuary was placed in service on Christmas Eve 2004. The work and contributions of members over the past twenty-five years was a gift to us and future generations, just as their work and contributions are a continuing outreach ministry to new generations. We respectfully believe that it's our turn to strengthen our inheritance and build on their work by commissioning a suitable pipe organ that was out-of-reach when the current sanctuary was constructed.

And to return to the challenges facing our church and community, if the future is more challenging for our church, this becomes a forceful argument to commission a pipe organ, not retreat from the goal, since a pipe organ is an endowment for future generations, relieving future congregations from the financial burden of

replacing a digital instrument every eighteen to twenty-five years, while providing it a marvelous legacy to draw new members and enhance in-person worship in our sanctuary.

Gift-Giving to one Ministry does not necessarily Compete with other Ministries:

Finally, we are reminded that gift-giving is not a zero-sum proposition, a dollar dedicated to the organ project or fellowship hall, for example, does not necessarily compete with other ministries. Our members think deeply and often pray about gift-giving, and the inspiration to support one ministry does not imply that it came at the expense of another ministry, including any outreach ministry, since not all givers share the same priorities with their generous gifts.

Let us remember that we glorify God in many ways, such as through worship, spreading the story of Jesus, and helping our fellow man, but also by walking in a peaceful forest to marvel at His creation, viewing a masterpiece of art that was inspired to praise God, and yes, to hear a magnificent pipe organ in service of the Lord.

Thank you for your thoughtful consideration of these issues. United Women in Faith calls for sound stewardship of the earth, and environmentally friendly lifestyles that preserve creation for the benefit of present and future generations.

Recycle, Reuse, Refresh, Reclaim, Rejoice

Many of us recycle on a regular basis, but we may do it incorrectly. According to Republic Services latest guidelines, we may recycle four types of items:

- **Plastics:** Must have a number 1 or 2 in the triangle on the bottom of the bottle or container. Rinse all bottles and get as much water out as possible. You may leave the lid on, but don't recycle a lid by itself.
- **Paper:** newspaper, envelopes, magazines, brochures, phone books. Do not recycle shredded paper, paper towels, napkins, or tissues!
- **Cardboard:** file folders, poster board, cardboard boxes, frozen food boxes. Do not recycle any cardboard which has food on it or which is wet!
- **Metal:** aluminum beverage cans, food cans, scrap metal. Do not recycle aluminum foil or aerosol cans!
- Items such as light bulbs, paint, electronics, hazardous materials, needles/syringes are all considered hazardous waste and must be disposed of with special handling. **The City of Apache Junction will have its next Free Hazardous Waste Disposal on Saturday, November 5, 2022, from 8 am to noon at the Apache Junction Public Works Facility at 575 E. Baseline Ave., Apache Junction.**

ST. ANDREWS CHILDREN'S CLINIC



For many years a group of GCUMC volunteers traveled to Nogales, AZ., twice a year, for a one-day mission trip, as the volunteers brought carloads filled with donated supplies and handmade quilts for the St. Andrew's Children's Clinic. Volunteer medical specialists have been serving Mexico's poorest families since 1973.

The clinic has moved from St. Andrew's Episcopal Church to a smaller temporary facility near the U.S. & Mexico border. The clinic currently serves about 40 families, administering medical treatments to children including Audiology, Nutrition, Orthopedics, Orthotics & Prosthetics, and Vision. The clinic continues to help with supplies & support for families during the cleft palate

surgeries.

Due to new guidelines and restrictions since Covid, St. Andrew's office staff has requested that outside



organizations not visit clinic sites at this time. St. Andrew's Children's Clinic staff members are looking forward to the future, with hopes they will have a permanent clinic to serve the children. Laura Romero, Executive Director said in a thank you letter to GCUMC; "All of this care is possible through generous donations from people like you.

Thank you for being a part of our team who makes miracles happen at our clinic." We would like to continue our support for this children's clinic by sending a monetary donation. We hope to resume our mission trips in the future.

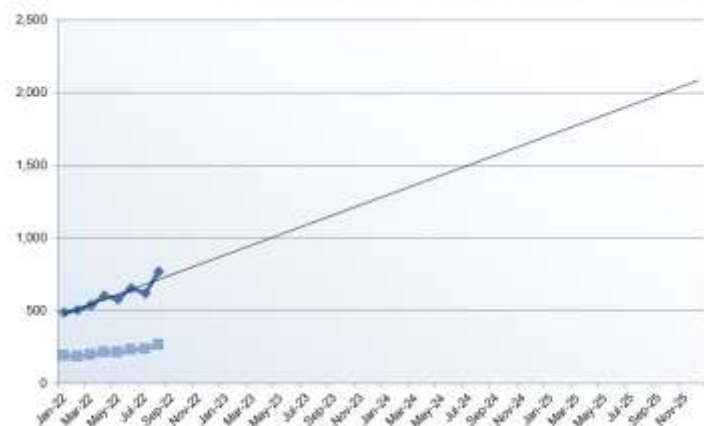
